What are you hoping for this summer?

A England double with Lewis Hamilton & Jensen Button in the driver's Championship in Grand Prix?

A victory for Andy Murray at Wimbledon?
[I'm writing this before Wimbledon....so ever the optimist!]

With such an exciting summer in terms of sport there is so much to hope for.

Every year we hope as a nation that this year it will be a good summer, that the sun will shine and the sky will remain blue, a 'Brit' will hold up a major sporting trophy and that there really is a pot of gold at the end of the rainbow!

We hope that a four leaf clover will bring us luck, that pulling the wish bone on a turkey will make our wish come true. We hope for good health, prosperity and good relationships.

Sometimes we may hope passionately that something will change and others hope that the same situation will never change.

We don't all put our hopes in the same things. Do we put our hopes in things, in others or

ourselves? What we hope for is personal. It can change with time, circumstances and needs. It can be misplaced or rewarded.

So what do we do when our hopes are dashed? *If* England doesn't get the result we've longed for? When the job interview is rejected, when someone we treasure walks away, when the news from the doctor is not what he'd wanted to hear?

When all other hopes have disappointed, what is your foundation for hope?

In the film *The Shawshank Redemption* the two central characters having been in prison for years have a running argument about hope. One of the inmates manages disappointment by giving up on hope, he believed....

'Hope is a dangerous thing. Hope can break your heart.'

The other inmate held on to hope, as 'to quit is to start dying'!

When the *things* we have hoped for disappoint, should we rather be looking for someone to hope in?

Isaiah the prophet, who gave both good and bad news to the people of Israel when they kept doing their own thing and chasing after false gods and false hopes, he believed that

'Those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength, they will fly like eagles!'

King David, with all his wealth, power and possessions knew that 'My hope is in the Lord.'

Jeremiah, thrown into a cistern for speaking God's word still believed

'That God plans to give you hope and a future.'

The writer of Hebrews described hope in God as *'an anchor for the soul, firm and secure.'*

When it seems that the ground is disappearing beneath our feet and our hope is draining away, God, through Jesus Christ, promises to be our hope, to be our anchor, to hold us fast against the tide.

The bleak quote of Dante from *Divine Comedy* 'Abandon hope all you who enter here' chills with the prospect of a place or time when there is no hope.

To know the God who is our hope brings us the promise of strength, purpose, meaning, peace, joy, love, forgiveness and life everlasting.

Where will you place your hope?

Do You Miss Traditional Services?

I was a choirboy from the age of five. In Church every Sunday I would repeat, sing and chant the Book of Common Prayer 1662 services.

This was a time before the Alternative Service Book. Hymns came from Ancient & Modern and we chanted the Psalms. There was not a suggestion that the Vicar would not wear his robes and clapping along to songs was something you did in the theatre (heaven forbid actions), if we had a short hymn or Psalm you only sang it once.

All the time I was in the choir, I have to confess that I did not have a clue what on earth it all meant. We sang the responses, said the Lords prayer twice (for some reason) and looked serious - except if you got struck with a fit of the giggles which was usually bought on by someone's stomach gurgling extremely loudly in a quiet part of the service.

All that changed with the arrival of a new vicar. He was young and wanted to turn around the downward spiral in the congregation. He was an evangelical. He was also extremely smart and an excellent preacher.

He based his first series of sermons on the Book of Common Prayer (if you want change start where people are at already). He explained what it all meant and its' relevance to the Bible, Christian living and in particular the Gospel Message. All of a sudden - after about 12 years - it made sense (except why we say the Lord's Prayer twice).

This was the start of my Christian faith.

Don't get me wrong; I don't think we should have the Book of Common Prayer at every service. The language is old and unfamiliar, it is a barrier to new people coming to Church and understanding the Gospel, however it does have its' place.

In our Church that place is the first Sunday of the month at 6.30pm. At this service we have hymns, psalms and the Prayer Book. We also have a choir.

This service is for you if you yearn for a little bit of Church of England tradition.

Summertime

It has been an odd season with so many differing temperatures. The sweet peas are still slow growing and whilst they remain 'short' their frequent tying up on their cordons is difficult. The Dahlias are growing into healthy bushy plants and already buds are appearing. The sunflowers are continuing to grow - their flowers eagerly awaited. The Hostas are looking superb provided the slugs can be kept at bay (spent coffee grounds are being used at present). The Lily of the Valley (Convallaria) were lovely but these are contained in tubs and their blooms gathered for vases indoors where the lovely perfume can be appreciated. A beautiful Poppy (Papaver) is in bloom at present and the pink florets look wonderful against the clematis Nelly Moser. The clematis Niobe is again in bud and growing on quite strongly. Following their pruning the Roses are growing into healthy bushes and already in bloom. The dead Laburnum tree has now been cut down and will be replaced with a Rowan (or mountain ash).

The seed mixtures — Sea of Pink, Cottage and butterfly mixture grew into healthy seedlings and are now in situ in various parts of the garden. For perfume Stocks were selected and these too are hardy.

The blue tit chicks have fledged and the blackbirds are feeding their hungry broods. Robin chicks are yet to be seen and the Greater Spotted Woodpecker is a frequent visitor. A Mallard and her ducklings were spotted — what a lovely sight!

We did some group activities in the sports hall including a newspaper fashion show in which many amazing outfits were created including a

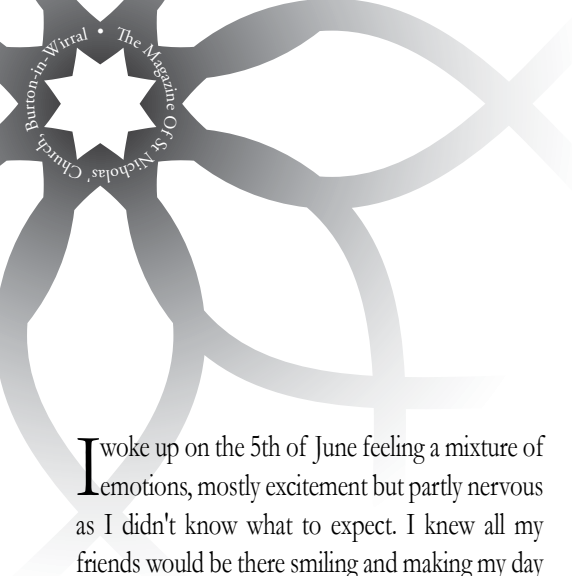

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Admissions to Bishop Wilson
