From our Vicar

t the time Leonardo da Vinci painted 'The \bigcap Last Supper' he had an enemy who was a painter. Da Vinci had a bitter argument with this man and despised him. So when da Vinci got to the face of Judas Iscariot he decided to use the face of his enemy so it would be present for all to see as the man who betrayed Jesus. As he worked on the faces of the other disciples he often tried to paint the face of Jesus, but just couldn't make any progress. He felt frustrated and confused and in time he realised what was wrong. His hatred for the other painter was holding him back. Only after he had made his peace with his fellow painter and repainted the face of Judas was he able to complete the face of Jesus and finish his masterpiece.

It seems that da Vinci discovered the truth of what Isabelle Holland wrote in the Long Search 'as long as you don't forgive, who and whatever it is will occupy rent free space in your head.'

Anger and resentment fester and consume those who allow them head space.

Events of the last few weeks have lead me to think alot about the nature of forgiveness and what happens when we chose not to. The very mixed reaction to the death of Baroness Thatcher has seen an outpouring of admiration and resentment not quite in equal measure. It has highlighted how deep seated anger, bitterness and the inability to forgive can and still is ripping families and communities apart in response to decisions made nearly thirty years ago. There is so much truth in the saying that people with clenched fists cannot shake hands!

Yet there are many stories of other communities that have taken the brave step and started to rebuild broken trust and to decide to forgive past hatreds. Projects in places like Belfast, South Africa and Rwanda which have long histories of hatred have brought people together to seek to forgive and rebuild their communities.

Edith Cavell before she was executed by Germans, being charged as a spy said 'Standing as I do in view of God and eternity, I realise that patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness towards anyone.'

Celebrating Easter reminds us all of the good news that God offers us all forgiveness. Through Jesus' death and resurrection it is now possible for us all to be forgiven and to know the freedom that comes when forgiveness is received. The joy of Easter is that as we have been forgiven, so we in turn are called to forgive others.

The Bible says 'get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger....be kind to each other, tender hearted, forgiving one another, just as God through Christ has forgiven you.' Ephesians 4: 31 - 32

It doesn't say it's easy... Let's pray that it is work in progress.

Church Expenses Now Exceed £2,000 per Week

Regular monthly donations, generously given, help meet the costs... but there is still a shortfall!

Regular 'churchgoers' at St Nicholas' Church in Burton currently help meet the rising cost of maintaining the church. On average, just over £2,000 per week is required in order to provide weekly acts of worship at a variety of services as well as meeting the needs of individuals and families throughout the year. At present, the shortfall between what we receive through our regular donations and our expenses is around £20,000 per annum.

As most people will realise, particularly during these times of general financial constraint, the infrastructure necessary to operate a successful church does cost money. For instance St Nicholas' has its own Vicar, but in addition it also has to maintain and repair the church building and run a vicarage. Heating and lighting is another expense as is the churchyard, utility bills and a host of general administration costs. Everything has to be paid for

locally as the church receives no direct funding from Chester Diocese or any national sources. And, whilst our church is probably more fortunate than many, we still need additional regular income to help meet our everyday expenses.

Could you help by making a regular monthly donation by standing order?

People within the parish are very generous. Whenever there is a specific need to finance a project, funding is often secured relatively promptly. Indeed, many of the people who support specific projects also contribute towards day-to-day church expenses every month. But to address the shortfall we need more people to contribute to church funds each month by standing order. Currently, some 40% of people who donate regularly give less than £4 per week. In stark contrast 6% of people regularly donate over £30 per week.



If 67 people who do not currently contribute regularly could find the means to donate around £25 per month, the shortfall would disappear. Realistically we need some people who do not currently donate regularly to begin to support the work of the church and for those who do already give regularly to review their funding with a view to increasing our overall income. So, if you would like to donate regularly to church funds you can download a standing order form from the website (www.burtonchurch.org.uk) or pick up a form from Church. Thank You.

Many of you will recall Dean and Paula Finnie when they last visited us in 2008 together with their 2 children Joel & Eli. At that time they worked in partnership with Cross Links and through our outward giving we supported their work in South Africa. In 2011 they found that the strategic direction being followed by Cross Links no longer aligned with what they felt they were called to do in South Africa and they made the decision to break away from Cross Links and join Christians Abroad as Associate Mission Partners. Christians Abroad is a project of the Churches Together in Britain and Ireland.

Dean and Paula felt strongly the need to plant a new Church in Macassar which with the help of the Lord came to fruition in February 2012 and is called the Tree of Life. Leading the new church was a whole new adventure for Dean, but one he definitely enjoyed. For Dean and Paula the greatest privilege had been to see some of the local folk step out and trust God as they tried different things for the first time.

We have received monthly newsletters from Dean and Paula keeping us up to date with their progress and you can see them in the following family picture.



In August 2012 as the Tree of Life Church turned 6 months old we were given some of the facts, figures to highlight their exciting journey by then as follows:

- They enjoy a committed core group of 30 adults and at least 10 children each week.
- Dean leads the church and is thrilled to have Chris and Gerrit committed to joining him in leadership.



- The ongoing relationship of friendship and support between Church of Love and Grace in Mitchell's Plain and Simon's Bay Christian Church and Tree of Life is proving to be life giving.
- They have enjoyed one outreach into the community in June and have since welcomed a whole family into the church as a result!
- They are about to conduct their first marriage as a church!
- They celebrated the Diamond wedding anniversary of their oldest member.
- They have enjoyed challenging and life giving teaching and preaching from Dean week by week and have welcomed two preachers from amongst themselves as they preached for the first time!
- Seven of their members are between the ages of 18 and 25.

In 2012, our outward giving split the support previously given to Cross Links to support both Cross Links and Dean and Paula with Christians Abroad, 50/50.

Dean and Paula (but without Joel and Eli this time) are visiting us again on 23 June to talk at both our services and it will be very interesting to learn how their missionary work has developed further.

Planting Time

The late heavy snow fall at the end of March was a disaster. Daffodils, crocus and hellebores were squashed under the heavy blanket of heavy snow. However, there is always a silver lining and following the sunshine there was an explosion of colour from the lovely spring flowers. The sweet peas were slow to germinate, having been sown (in the greenhouse) on 16 March. Hopefully they will be ready to plant out in early May. The Gladioli Primadonna and Africa are currently in trays and the Dahlias, Arabian Night, Christine and Pompon Little William are also in pots and will only be planted out when all danger of frost has gone. Nature's Haven (a mixture especially for butterflies) Aster, Duchess Mix, Cornflowers and Lettuce allsorts have been potted up. Of course, Larkspur and Sunflower seeds cannot be missed off the list. Most geraniums have survived the winter. They were cut down and re-potted and are now growing on well. The Camelias were slow to flower. There are masses of seedlings to be pricked out - will the bulbs in the pots and tubs finish flowering before the new plants are ready?

Bark will once again be spread over the large border in the rear garden as this is mostly planted with shrubs and small trees - it cuts down on the weeding. There have been many blackbirds, blue, great and long-tailed tits feeding in the garden and during the cold snaps a few field fares, Greater spotted woodpecker, thrushes and of course robins. Cedric's appearances have become infrequent recently (pheasant).




