COMPASSION & COMMUNITY

We live in a world where mental ability is rewarded. We are given puzzles and brain training exercises from apps on our phones and tablets, or we strive to do the good old newspaper crossword. But the heart is not trained, it often just muddles along. We learn more and more but often understand less and less. 24/7 media reports stream information about wars and disasters right into our living room, but we are likely to become less affected what his compassion looks like. by a disaster in the next village than previous generations would have been.

Yet compassion can reach out across the barriers of class, status or ability to the person who is hurting. Compassion does not rely on knowledge or learning, the good 'Samaritan' only needed to know where the sore was to pour the soothing oil.

So many people in the UK have suffered severe flooding of their homes and communities. Throughout the Middle East and into Europe, millions of refugees escaping from war and destruction are facing the worst of winter conditions with little shelter and less protection. We have seen heart-warming demonstrations of compassion and sacrificial giving to offer hope to those who are vulnerable and exposed as well as the cruel and intentional destruction beyond our comprehension. How moved are our hearts?

There are at least 67 references in the Old Testament alone to the compassionate nature of God. God in his compassion sees the need of his people, people caught up in the chains of bad habits, destructive choices and sinful lives. Compassion involves action; it's not just a feeling, but a feeling that just has to do something to make a difference.



God the Father sent us Jesus to demonstrate

Jesus in his compassion reaches out to everyone and anyone, not just the knowledgeable or clever, but the vulnerable and needy. Jesus reaches out, looking for hearts that are simply open to receive him; hearts that can still be moved. If we find we still respond a little, then all is not lost. The heart is still alive and kicking, able to be coaxed into generosity and able to prioritise and focus.

Peter de Vries the American writer wrote:

'We are not put on this earth to see through each other, but to see each other through.'

An opportunity to 're-tune' our hearts is to intentionally use Lent as a time to find out how we can make a difference. The Christian Aid publication 'Count Your Blessings' gives us 40 days of reflecting upon our blessings and gives the opportunity to give, act and pray for communities in need. Look it up on the Christian Aid website or see the leaflets that are at the back of church.

Love of God should be the first priority, for true love of ourselves and of our neighbours both flow from this.

The day was blessed with over 600 people supporting this event. Guests included: the Rt Hon Iain Duncan Smith; Bishop Peter Forster; Bishop Michael Baughen; Bishop Keith Sinclair; the Dean of the Cathedral Gordon McPhate; the Lord Lieutenant of Cheshire David Briggs; The Mayor of Chester Hugo Deynem; and the Mayor of Wrexham Barbara Roxburgh.

The service included hymns written by Graham Kendrick who also attended and brought his hymns alive. The recessional hymn "Lord for the Years" written by Bishop Michael Baughen.

The Cathedral Nave Choir enriched the service with the anthem "Tres Magi de Gentibus" and the reading from Matthew was read by Mark Mitchell who is a great supporter of Save the Family.

The service included 3 videos depicting "The Past" (with the founder Edna Speed) "The Present" and "The Future". The atmosphere in the Cathedral was extremely warm with a strong sense that Jesus was with us showing his support for our faithful service in helping some of the most vulnerable families from our community.

HYMN STORIES

'THERE IS A GREEN HILL FAR AWAY'

Mrs Cecil Frances Alexander 1818 - 1895

There is a green hill far away,
Without a city wall,
Where the dear Lord was crucified,
Who died to save us all.


We may not know, we cannot tell,
What pains he had to bear;
But we believe it was for us
He hung and suffered there.

He died that we might be forgiven, He died to make us good, That we might go at last to heaven, Saved by his precious blood.

There was no other good enough
To pay the price of sin;
He only could unlock the gate
Of heaven and let us in.

O dearly, dearly has he loved, And we must love him too, And trust in His redeeming blood, And try his works to do.





It is said that Mrs Alexander wrote this hymn whilst sitting at the bedside of her sick child. At the time she lived not far from the walled city of Londonderry, where her husband was the Bishop, and it is thought that the sight of the massive town walls and the green hills behind might have inspired the very visual images her words produce.

Cecil Frances Alexander was born in Redcross, County Wicklow; the second daughter of a British Army Major. She was a devout Christian and from a young age showed an aptitude for writing.

In 1848, at the age of just 25, she published "Hymns for Little Children" and dedicated it to her "little godsons".

In 1850 she married the Revd. William Alexander. He was six years her junior and the marriage caused quite a stir, and it is said that her Father, for the sake of propriety, had her date of birth altered in the Registers – and indeed in some old hymn books her date of birth is listed as 1823.

'There is a green hill' was written to illustrate the creed "suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, dead and buried". The first verse paints a picture that captures the imagination. The original hymn has the words "without a city wall", but later versions changed it to "outside a city wall". The second verse celebrates the mystery of the cross beginning, "We may not know, we cannot tell . . ." The passion of Jesus, though difficult to comprehend, is something he endured for us and for our salvation. This is celebrated in the next two verses "He died that we might be forgiven, he died to make us good". "There was no other good enough to pay the price of sin".

Although this hymn was written for children it has become a classic Easter hymn for all ages. It sets the scene for the Lord's passion and celebrates the mystery, purpose, necessity and challenge of the cross. It is usually sung to the tune "Horsley" written by William Horsley (1774 – 1858).

Mrs Alexander devoted her life to Christian education and to the care of the young and the poor. All the profits from the sale of her writings were donated to a home for deaf children. She was buried – at her request – in Londonderry... outside the city walls.

NATURE NOTES

Spring has sprung!

The lovely Galanthus Nivalis (Snowdrops) finally came into bloom followed by winter Aconites with their yellow flowers and green rosettes of leaves – they brighten up dull days.

This time of year is truly wonderful with all the different varieties of spring flowering bulbs, especially daffodils and tulips and of course the English Bluebells. The white unnamed camellia was first to bloom (double white flowers) followed by two pinks named Felice Harris and Lady Macon. These shrubs are covered with net curtains during heavy frosts.

The greenhouse has been cleaned again and various pots and trays washed and filled with seed and cutting compost. The sweet pea seeds have already been greatly reduced in number – only 60 and although the colours are known, the variety is not!

Other seeds sown will be Annuals Mix, Cosmos, Razzmatazz, Cornflower, Larkspur (flowers good for pressing), Nicotiana (for perfume) and Pansy.



Vegetable seeds have also been purchased, but this "department" belongs to my husband! The Buddleia Davidii have been pruned hard and the Twisted Hazel has been trimmed as it now has many catkins and cannot be pruned.

Some jobs you can be getting on with in March and April

- Prune roses, deadhead spring flowering bulbs, lift/divide any overcrowded snowdrops.
- Pinch out the tips of sweet peas
- Remove brown florets from hydrangeas

Many birds have entered the garden recently; tiny Jenny Wren, a pair of robins and blue, coal and long-tailed tits.

The blue tits have inspected the nest box – will they take up residence this year?

A Message of 'Thanks' from the Trustees of Wirral Foodbank

In total last year Wirral Foodbank fed and supported 10,676 people – entirely thanks to the consistent and unwavering donations of food given by church collections, food drop-off points and supermarket collections.

Many of our clients are single – young and old, and come to our distribution centres on foot. We therefore really appreciate receiving smaller packets of sugar (500g), rice (500g) and tea bags (40s). In fact we have found that the 40s and 80s sizes of tea bags easily contain enough for 3 days supply for most of our families too, and that larger packs (160s and 240s) are less in demand (and can also be difficult to carry because they are so bulky).

We have received a very steady supply of beans during the last year, and now have enough to see us through for at least the next six months. However we are currently very short on;

- Cordial
- Sponge pudding and Custard
- Dried milk and Smash (dried potato)
- Deodorant (men and women),
- Feminine hygiene
- Washing powder (tablets preferred as they can be spilt and distributed)

We are unable to take any more baby food or baby milk, and the Healthy Start Food Voucher Scheme is now available to many families in need. However the request for nappies continues to be high.
