THE VICAR WRITES

I have had to change my route for the daily dog walk. I was horrified to see the puppy, with great excitement and joy, start to run through a field of beautifully growing wheat. She thought it was great fun. I didn't. She was immediately put on her lead and we have changed our route. Whilst we may have had a 'right' to walk along the path that runs alongside the field there is also a responsibility to ensure that the crop is allowed to grow.

We all have rights; the right to be heard, to be valued, to be allowed to live on an even pitch. Rights are vitally important and help to protect the vulnerable. However, 'rights' are part of a two sided coin and come along with 'responsibilities' which is often the overlooked side of the coin.

Indira Gandhi reflected that `people tend to forget their duties but remember their rights.'

Each one of us will have a different set of responsibilities or duties; family, work, friends, choices and behaviour, but does God ever come into that list?

Being part of God's family brings the 'right to be called children of God' [John 1: 12] and all the joys of forgiveness, mercy, grace and life eternal. However, there are also responsibilities that go hand in hand with that right.

Responsibility to live as God's family means obeying God's call on our lives to 'love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind and soul and to love others as yourself.'

A clear sign of our commitment to God and the church lies in understanding our responsibility to prioritise and to give of our time, money and abilities.



Giving is at the centre of God's character. God gives us life and his giving is renewed daily. The Bible teaching is clear, that giving is the responsibility of all members of God's family -giving carried out in proportion to the gifts that have been given.

Over the next few months we will be looking at ways in which we can increase our giving to enable us to meet our responsibilities as a parish to support the work of the Diocese, to continue to maintain the fabric of the church and churchyard and to fund the mission and ministry which will enable our church to grow and flourish.

The PCC is considering five ways in which we aim to achieve this including a "Friends of St Nicholas' Church" scheme; to increase giving by standing order; to encourage cash gifts to be Gift Aided; to increase the number of people giving regularly and to set up an online giving link on the website

To help achieve this we will be open to ideas from across the parish and we will also look at what the Bible has to say;

'those who sow generously reap generously, those who sow sparingly, will reap sparingly....for God loves a cheerful giver.' 2 Corinthians 9: 6-7

New Pre-School Opens

From this September, a 'Pre-School' will be operating from Burton Bishop Wilson School. The Village Playschool (which is currently located at the Gladstone Village and increase the early year's Hall) will be operating from two sites; the babies and under 2s will remain at the GVH and the older children will move to Bishop Wilson School.

As with many small rural communities throughout the country, on pupil numbers, highlighted by the directly affects the funding for the school. With the varying intake numbers, the school has to be flexible in its approach to class structures. We are fortunate to have an experienced team of staff, which allows us to alter the class structure as the demand changes. This year we have made the change from four classes to three, which will give the benefit of larger friendship groups, alongside some very focused teaching. We always keep our pupils at the forefront of every decision and this is evidenced by our good SATs results - a great accolade to our excellent staff and amazing pupils. HYMN STORIES

'Onward Christian Soldiers'
Rev. Sabine Baring-Gould in 1865

Chorus
Onward, Christian soldiers,
Marching as to war,
With the cross of Jesus,
Going on before.

Christ the royal master, Leads against the foe; Forward into battle, See his banners go!

Baring-Gould originally set the lyrics to a melody from the slow movement of Joseph Haydn's Symphony in D, No. 15. This was printed in 1871 in an English church periodical, the Church Times.

Due to its militaristic theme and martial melody, the hymn encountered some resistance to its use in Church services, although the hymn itself is said to be about the spiritual battle – that the foe is Satan and that the Commander is Christ.

Sabine Baring-Gould's life was as controversial as his most famous work. He was born in January 1834 and had an unconventional childhood with much travelling around Europe with private tutors – indeed he only received two years of formal education, first at Kings College School and then at Warwick Grammar School. He took Holy Orders in 1864 and in 1868 he married Grace Taylor, a millgirl half his age.

He was dedicated to antiquarian pursuits alongside his life as squire and parson of a small Devonshire village. He was regarded as one of the top ten novelists of his time and wrote prolifically on his travels, religious matters, historical figures and on many other topics. Over 1200 publications are listed in his bibliography. He also translated the carol "Gabriel's Message" from the Basque language to English and wrote the hymn "Now the day is over"

He was an early archaeologist in the West Country but he regarded his greatest achievement to be his collection of songs, most of them derived from singers in Devon and Cornwall.

Baring-Gould died in January 1924.

100 Kilometre 'Nightrider' Cycle Ride for Charity

Puddington residents Gail and Willie Fulton have thanked people for the support their charity, *The Mango Tree*, continues to receive from within the parish. And, as part of a recent sponsored event on Merseyside Gail and Willie both cycled 100k on the night of 16 July to raise money for the Mango Tree.

Gail writes:

"This year **The Mango Tree** is celebrating 10 years of working in Kenya and 13 years in Tanzania. We are building on a foundation of trust, especially reaching out to children, women, girls and disabled people. When we arrived in both these deprived areas, there was devastation, due to the affects of HIV/ AIDS. Land was not cultivated, grandmothers were coping with many orphans, children were living alone in their parents' huts. The communities could not cope. One local woman was feeding 30 orphans a day with financial help from her children who all worked in Nairobi. We started by helping with education, healthcare and psychosocial support. Our aim was to turn our orphans from being a liability to their guardians into self-reliant adults.

Such is the success of the work that a secondary school headmaster said at a recent graduation ceremony for university graduates, teachers and vocational tradesmen and women "The Mango Tree is giving us back hope. These young graduates will go on improving this area for the rest of their lives." The alumni are already supporting younger orphans through The Mango Tree, which is something we did not expect, but is extremely gratifying. Some of our original orphans are now in secondary or tertiary education, so are we are also having to find the funding for that. We need to raise £600,000 a year! So, from all the 25,000 orphans The Mango Tree has helped over the last 13 years, a BIG THANK YOU!

Thank you also to those who sponsored us, not only for our cycle ride, but also the tremendous support we have received from the church for so many years. It is wonderful to have so much local support.

NATURE NOTES

Summer Turns to Autumn!

At the time of 'putting pen to paper' all the Rowan Trees (aka Mountain Ash) have masses of beautiful berries - truly a sight to behold.

Disappointingly this year the sweet peas were slow to start and then most of the plants either died or produced fewer flowers than expected.

On a more positive note the dahlias have been wonderful especially 'Natal' with its rich lovely colour.
Quite a spectacle.



The Eryngium (Sea Holly) are growing on well and the stalks are already a lovely blue colour. Again the gladioli have been slow to flower and some not at all. The fuchsias have been spectacular both in the tubs and the hanging baskets.

The buddleia 'Davidii' were also slow to flower this year but are now wonderful and have been attracting many bees as have the hebes.



Some severe pruning has taken place in the wide borders in the rear garden. 'Harry Lauder's Walking Stick' (Twisted Hazel) was growing in to a rose and a lilac bush. The camellia which had been removed from its tub and planted in the garden is now growing well and is looking healthy.

A variety of birds have been seen in the garden recently including Nuthatch; Blue, Great and Long-tail Tits; Robins; Wagtail; and Jenny Wren who ca be seen but not heard.

Tasks to be getting on with:

- Continue to dead-head flowers for extra growth
- Collect ripe seeds for next year's planting
- · Water and feed the tubs don't let them dry out
- · As autumn draws on, plant your spring-flowering bulbs

Holly's Story

Having always worked and never claimed benefits, Holly, 29 was bringing up her four-year-old daughter,

Phoebe alone. She was determined to give her the best possible start in life.



The council flat that Holly was living in was in a very deprived area. Holly was adamant that her daughter should have a better environment to grow up in and was offered alternative accommodation near her parents, but at double the cost.


As well as borrowing money from her parents to meet the cost, Holly was working part time. At the same time, she had been selling second-hand clothes online and the shop she was working in noticed its success and offered her a space selling clothes. Under normal circumstances, Holly could just about scrape by, but when her daughter became poorly and had to spend three weeks in hospital, she was forced to stop work temporarily. When Phoebe recovered, they returned home to empty kitchen cupboards, bills racking up and little or no income to support them. Holly felt unable to ask her family for help again and after speaking with the local Citizens Advice Bureau she was referred to the foodbank.

Holly said: "The people at the Foodbank were wonderful, they understood and saved us." Today Holly is back at work.

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
