Being a servant isn't exactly something many people would initially think they would want to rush to do, unless your surname was Jeeves perhaps! Being a 'slave to the kitchen sink' does not give serving a good image, yet we all like good service when we go to the shops, eat out or get the car fixed. We can easily spot bad service when we see it, just as we enjoy good service when it comes our way.

On the 2nd June 1953 Elizabeth was crowned Queen of the Commonwealth and Empire. For the whole of her adult life, she has sought to serve her country in the best way she can, and she has written in the foreword to the book 'The Servant Queen and the King she serves'

*'In my First Christmas broadcast in 1952, I asked the people of the Commonwealth and Empire to pray for me as I prepared to dedicate myself to their service at my Coronation. As I enter my 91st year, I remain eternally grateful for those prayers and to God for His steadfast love. I have seen His faithfulness to me, as I have sought to serve.'*¹

This is a wonderful celebratory book of the Queen's 90 years and highlights her strong faith in God; it is that faith which has helped her to serve when at times it must have been so hard to keep going.

In her Christmas broadcast in 2012 she said 'God sent his only Son 'to serve and not to be served'. He restored love and service to the centre of our lives in the person of Jesus Christ.' Jesus made it clear to his privileged disciples that he 'did not come to be served, but to give his life as a ransom for many.' [Matthew 20:28]

Jesus told stories about the faithful servant, the wise servant, the forgiving servant and he himself did the job of a servant at the Last Supper when he washed the filthy, grubby



feet of his disciples before they shared their meal.

To follow Jesus means to follow in the ways of the servant King who '*humbled himself..even to death on a cross.*' [Philippians 2:8]

Whom do we serve? The best indicator is where do we invest most of our time, money or passions? Is it TV, football, power and influence, career, image, relationships? Not that these are bad things, but when they are all consuming then it becomes clear whom we serve.

Queen Elizabeth is right when she combines love with service to God, because the two are inextricably linked. Perhaps she based it on St. Paul's words.....

'Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart as if working for the Lord....it is the Lord you are serving.' [Colossians 3:2]

The problem is.....

'Most people wish to serve God.....but only in an advisory capacity.'

Next morning at St Nicholas' Church, Burton at the 10.00am family service I will celebrate my first Holy Communion. Afterwards there will be a bring and share meal at the vicarage - please all pray for **less** rain this year!

There will be a sign-up sheet at the back of both Burton and Shotwick churches as you will need tickets for Chester Cathedral. If you are unable to join us at any of these events please do keep Sarah, James and me in your prayers.

REFLECTIONS ON OUR 2016 EASTER CELEBRATIONS

MAUNDY THURSDAY SEDER MEAL

On Maundy Thursday about 44 members of our church, adults and children alike, gathered in the Gladstone Village Hall to share in the Seder. This is a special family meal which Jewish people have every year during their Passover celebrations. It commemorates the years of slavery which their ancestors endured in Egypt and also their eventual miraculous deliverance under the leadership of Moses. It is also the meal which Jesus would have eaten, which Christians call the Last Supper, on the night before his crucifixion. Each element eaten or drunk in the Seder has a special significance and is introduced by words of Scripture.

The room was beautifully set out for us, the tables put together in a sort of 'U' shape with lovely white table cloths and candles. The ceremony began with the lighting of the candles and we sang a hymn about the Light of Christ coming into the world. The meal began with bitter herbs [a tiny taste of horseradish] and a sweet brown mixture of chopped nuts, honey, apple and cinnamon representing the mortar used by the Israelite slaves for the making of bricks, all symbolising their hard suffering.

We also had a bowl of salt water in which we dipped a sprig of parsley representing their tears and pain. We were shown a roasted lamb bone representing the Pascal lamb and a hard boiled egg – a symbol of mourning.

We shared with each other plates of matzo, which is a crisp cracker of unleavened bread, a reminder of the Israelite's hurried escape from Egypt when there was no time to wait for the yeast to rise.



At last came the more familiar main dish of lamb or vegetable casserole which we served to one another and thoroughly enjoyed. And after that honey or lemon cake. Four times during the course of the Seder we filled our glasses with wine or grape juice, a symbol of celebrating the slaves' freedom. The children present also played a part as Jewish children would, asking questions at several points: why we are doing this or that? They also came round to serve the cake to us.

Altogether it was a lovely family occasion and we do thank all those who made the delicious casseroles and cakes, those who prepared the tables and served us, those who washed up and moved the furniture and not least our Vicar, Cathy Helm, who guided everyone through the evening.



EASTER EGG ROLLING

Messy Church had its annual egg rolling in the Vicarage garden on Easter Saturday and, despite the heavy rain, 36 brave children came along with their families to hunt for eggs, decorate them and roll them down the garden.

Most managed to get their eggs decorated before being totally soaked. We had to resort to the Vicarage for cakes and prize giving to try and keep dry. The Easter Bonnet Parade was a huge success with very beautifully decorated hats, with winners for three age groups including an adult section!

A huge thanks to everyone for organising a wonderful afternoon which the children thoroughly enjoyed and didn't seem to mind at all that they were soaked.

GOOD FRIDAY SERVICES & WALK OF WITNESS



On a beautiful Spring afternoon a congregation made up of Shotwick and Burton worshippers assembled at the church of St Michael's for a service of readings, hymns and quiet reflection.

Basil Keys and Ruth Abbott provided the readings - Ruth using Stephen Cottrell's writing on 'the Seamless Robe'. This was a wonderful and moving start to the proceedings.

After the service about thirty church members as well as a few enthusiastic canines, enjoyed a gentle walk over the fields to Puddington and then on to Burton.

The wooden cross was carried along as a very solid reminder of our purpose and there was a real feeling of camaraderie as we walked and talked together.

The very welcome sight of tea and buns awaited us at St Nicholas' Church and thanks are due to those who provided and served them to us.

At 4 o'clock the church became hushed as a large congregation made ready for the second half of our solemn service. Once again Ruth read extracts from the meaningful text and Mark Turner read passages from the Bible. Hymns were sung and the atmosphere of awe and sadness was very pronounced as we all quietly dispersed from the church.



HYMN STORIES

'Rock of Ages'

Augustus Toplady 1740 – 1778



*Rock of Ages, cleft for me,
let me hide myself in thee;
let the water and the blood,
from thy wounded side which flowed,
be of sin the double cure;
save from wrath and make me pure.*

*Not the labours of my hands
can fulfil thy law's commands;
could my zeal no respite know,
could my tears forever flow,
all for sin could not atone;
thou must save, and thou alone.*

*Nothing in my hand I bring,
simply to the cross I cling;
naked, come to thee for dress;
helpless, look to thee for grace;
foul, I to the fountain fly;
wash me, Saviour, or I die.*

*While I draw this fleeting breath,
when mine eyes shall close in death,
when I soar to worlds unknown,
see thee on thy judgment throne,
Rock of Ages, cleft for me,
let me hide myself in thee.*

Augustus Toplady was born in England in 1740. His father was a Royal Marine who died shortly after Augustus' birth, leaving Augustus to be raised by his mother.

Augustus had an interest in religion during his younger years, and aged 15 he felt he had a calling from God and became determined to go into ministry. Having been converted under Methodism, Augustus initially aimed to become a Methodist Minister. This changed, however, after he studied the 39 Articles of the Church of England. He became convinced of the Calvinistic perspective and decided to become a minister in the Church of England.

The issue of Calvinism versus Arminianism was a hot topic in the Church in those days, and for the remainder of his life Augustus would write and debate on the subject – arguing at length for the doctrine of election. Unfortunately, towards the end of his short life, the debate grew increasingly ugly, resulting in a major and public rift between him and John Wesley that would never find resolution.

Augustus wrote a number of hymns in his life, but "Rock of Ages" is by far his most famous.

There is a common story of the hymn being inspired by (and even written from within) a rock cleft that he once took refuge in during a storm. The particular rock is in Burrington Combe Gorge in North Somerset, England, and it has a plaque on it with this claim to fame. However, the story is now thought to be apocryphal.

Augustus was most likely inspired to write the hymn after reading the preface of John and Charles Wesleys' *Hymns on the Lord's Supper* (1745) which contains a prayer voicing many of the themes and words that are also found in the hymn.

Augustus Toplady died aged 38 from tuberculosis. He never married.

NATURE NOTES

It's Planting Time!


Sunshine at last but followed by strong winds and rain yet again. There were, however, masses of daffodils and to name a few – King Alfred, Tête-à-Tête, Cheerfulness, Minnow and Rip Van Winkle. To date the tulips are yet to bloom. Five seedlings of Eryngium (sea holly) are growing on well and will be planted into various parts of the garden.

The brown florets on the hydrangeas have been trimmed off. The bulbs will be removed from the various pots and tubs to await the planting of the various summer bedding etc.

When four true leaves appear on the sweet pea seedlings the tops will be pinched to promote healthy growth. When the seedlings are strong and hardy, they will be “hardened off” prior to planting out.

The rockery is always a problem and the heathers which have grown too leggy have been removed and a good weeding has taken place. This task was undertaken by my husband – I am too busy in the greenhouse: sowing seeds, pricking out seedlings and the usual cry “the greenhouse is too small!”

Some dahlias were left in the ground over the winter, so hopefully they will have survived.



A new crimson dahlia has been purchased (Natal) but will not be planted out until all danger of ground frost has passed.

Some jobs you can be getting on with in May and June

- *Dead head spring flowering bulbs*
- *Plant out dahlias and other annuals*
- *Harden off and plant seedlings*
- *Weeding! (these are the tasks that apply to the writer!)*

The blue tits are yet to occupy one bird box but possibly a pair of wrens have taken over the sparrow box. There are pairs of blackbirds and a duo of robins and many long tailed tits frequenting the garden.

PARISH FINANCES



In 2015 the PCC experienced a significant annual deficit on its current account activities (the difference between its ordinary income and its ordinary expenditure).

St Nicholas' Church in all respects has to be self-funding and the PCC receives no direct external income from the Church of England, the Government or the public purse. It costs approximately £1,900 per week to cover the cost of maintaining a church and a church community in Burton and Puddington.

The deficit in 2015 is consistent with the pattern of financial performance shown in the accounts in previous years. For 2015 this deficit was £18,511.87 as shown in the illustration below.

It is unlikely that such a deficit can be sustained for much longer and as a consequence the PCC has approached Chester Diocese with a view to agreeing a reduction in the Parish Share paid to the Diocese towards ministry costs (Vicar's salary, pension and related costs, other clergy expenses, Diocesan and administrative costs etc.).

In seeking a reduction over the longer-term it is possible that the parish of Burton may not continue to receive the level of ministry input that it has enjoyed for so long.

If you are able, please support your parish church with a regular donation from your bank account or by using the Gift Aid envelopes in church. Just £35 per month from an average household who attend church services during the year would ensure that the ministry and facilities of your parish church are maintained.
