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THE VICAR WRITES



Do you remember the toothpaste advert which had the premise that if you used that product you too could walk around with a ring of confidence

shining around your head!?

It may be that you feel confident in many or just some aspects of life - but is Christian faith something you can be confident in these days? How confident are we in sharing or showing others our faith in God?

In a society where often Christian values are not held as relevant, do we have a tendency to keep our heads down? Let's remember we're in good company: the disciples had the benefit of eating,

walking and sharing with Jesus, yet they lacked confidence; Peter swore he never knew Jesus and John Mark ran off naked in his haste to get away!

Jesus got his confidence from his baptism and God's assurance; from his understanding of Scriptures which sustained him during his testing in the desert for 40 days, and from his deep relationship with God the Father, kept alive through prayer and regular worship. Can those things help us too? Here are some confidence boosting promises:

'Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name; you are mine. When you pass through the waters I will be with you.' Isaiah 43: 1-2

'For God so loved the world, that He gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.' John 3: 16

'If anyone acknowledges that Jesus is the Son of God, God lives in them and they live in God......God is love. Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in them.' 1 John 4: 15

We are called for a purpose, to keep the flame of integrity alive, to encourage the discouraged and love the unloved, to tell of the amazing Lord Jesus we have discovered and point towards a better way.

As we approach and journey through Easter we can have confidence in Jesus who went to the cross in our place to take away our sins and who broke the power of sin and death through his amazing resurrection. The disciples on the day Jesus was crucified had no confidence whatsoever and yet three days later were full of excitement and joy, they had complete confidence in the risen Jesus whom they had seen, touched, talked and walked with.

There are opportunities over the next three months to be encouraged. Join us for the Lent course 'Finding a Voice', at the Easter Services and for the Walk of Witness from St Michael's Shotwick to St Nicholas' Church on Good Friday.

As we carry the cross across the fields we are reminded of the journey that Jesus took. It's humbling to carry a cross. It's gives confidence in Jesus, the Son of God, who loved us enough to carry his cross all the way to Calvary.



MOTHERING SUNDAY

HISTORY OF MOTHERING SUNDAY

On most Sundays in years gone by churchgoers in England worshipped at their nearest parish church often referred to as the 'daughter church'. Centuries ago it was considered important for people to return to their home or 'mother' church once a year. So each year in the middle of Lent, people would visit their 'mother' church - the main church or cathedral of the area.

Inevitably the return to the 'mother' church became an occasion for family reunions when children who were working away returned home. It was quite common in those days for children to leave home for work once they were ten years old.

Many historians think that it was the return to the 'mother' church which led to the tradition of children, particularly those working as domestic servants, or as apprentices, being given the day off to visit their mother and family. As they walked along the lanes, children would pick wild flowers or violets to take to church or to give to their mother as a small gift.

TRADITIONAL FOODS

Mothering Sunday was also known as Refreshment Sunday because the fasting rules for Lent were relaxed that day. Originally, both Old and New Testament lessons on mid-lent Sunday made a point of food. The Gospel reading from the New Testament told the story of how Jesus fed 5,000 people with only five loves and two small fish.



"Now there was much grass in the place; so the men sat down, in number about five thousand. Jesus then took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted."

John 6:10-12

SIMNEL CAKE

The food item specially associated with Mothering Sunday is the Simnel cake; a fruit cake with two layers of almond paste, one on top and one in the middle. The cake is made with 11 balls of marzipan icing on top representing the 11 disciples (Judas is not included). Traditionally, sugar violets would also be added.

The name Simnel probably comes from the Latin word *simila* which means a fine wheat flour usually used for baking a cake.

However, there's a legend that a man called Simon and his wife Nell argued over whether the cake for Mothering Sunday should be baked or boiled. In the end they did both, so the cake was called after both of them: hence the name Sim-Nel!

MARCH

The Month for Mothers

Friday 3 March is the Women's World day of Prayer. This is a global ecumenical movement of Christian women.

In more than 170 countries, women come together on the first Friday in March to join in prayer and action for peace and justice. The event aims to bring together women of various races, cultures and churches in fellowship and understanding.

At 2.00pm on 3 March a service celebrating this event will be held at Neston Parish Church. There will also be an evening service at St George's Church in Thornton Hough starting at 7.30pm.

Sunday 28 March is Mothering Sunday - the fourth Sunday of Lent. Although it's often called Mothers' Day it has no connection with the American festival of that name. Traditionally, it was a day when children, mainly daughters, who had gone to work as domestic servants were given a day off to visit their mother and family.

Today Mothering Sunday is a day when children give presents, flowers, and home-made cards to their mothers.

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THE GOSPEL WRITERS


This is the first of four articles that look at the writers behind the four gospels in the New Testament.

PART 1 - THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO ST MARK

In contrast to their order in the New Testament, the first of the four gospels to be written was that according to Mark. It was probably written between AD 65 and 75, at least thirty years after the death and resurrection of Jesus. Mark's gospel was not the earliest book of the New Testament to be written. Paul's letters to the churches he founded were written much earlier.

Mark was not a disciple of Jesus and we are not really sure of his true identity. Some think he was the young man who ran naked from of these would, of course, be the the Garden of Gethsemane (Mark 14:51) or the companion of Barnabas and Paul on one of their journeys (Acts 12:25) or the friend of the writer of 1 Peter (1 Peter 5: 13) However, as Mark was the most through martyrdom. Mark took common name in the Roman Empire at that time, we have no way of definitely identifying him.

It appears that he was most probably a member of a Christian community in Rome and that he very likely knew the disciple, Peter, very well.



Key verse: Mark 16: 6

'Don't be alarmed! You are looking for Jesus from Nazareth who was nailed to a cross. God has raised him to life, and he isn't here.'

A 15 minute start: Chapters 1,6,10, 14 – 16

Or just read it all in one go, it's not that long!

Before Mark wrote his gospel, stories about Jesus circulated in the Early Church both verbally and in writing. The main source disciples. The reason Mark decided to bring these together into a gospel was, probably, the passing of many of the original twelve disciples, in many cases these stories and wove them together into his gospel. Rather like a seamstress making a bedcover out of different coloured or patterned squares of cloth, Mark assembled them in the way he felt they would go together best, acting both as an editor and writer.

Mark's gospel is very short - you can read it all in a couple of hours. It is not a life story of Jesus and has little chronology except for the last week of Jesus' life, to which Mark devotes a quarter of his gospel.

It starts with Jesus, as a man, being baptised by John the Baptist and ends abruptly at chapter 16 verse 8 with the women fleeing from followed, for the empty tomb. The rest of chapter 16 - verses 9 to 20 - is an addition to the gospel, written by someone else at a much later date.

Scholars are divided in their opinions whether Mark originally finished his gospel on such an abrupt note. Some think Mark's original ending was lost, others that he died before he could complete it while others feel that was the way Mark intended to end it, leaving the **Praying for** reader to draw the conclusion, through faith, that Jesus had been raised from the dead.

By writing the first gospel, Mark paved the way for the others. Indeed, as we shall see, his gospel acted as a blueprint, particularly for the writers of Matthew and Luke who copied great chunks of Mark's gospel into their own writings.


There will then be another short service from 4.00pm at St Nicholas' Church as we remember and reflect upon that first Good Friday.

The Lord of The Dance



This popular hymn was written in 1963. It owes much to the traditional Christmas Carol "Tomorrow shall be my dancing day".

Sydney Bertram Carter was an English poet, folk musician and Quaker. He was born in Camden Town, London and studied at Oxford University. During the war he served, as a committed pacifist, in the Friends' Ambulance.

Carter wrote the lyrics 'Lord of the Dance' as an adaptation of Joseph Brackett's 'Simple Gifts' as a tribute to Shaker music. He once said "I did not think the churches would like it at all. I thought many people would find it pretty far flown, probably heretical and anyway dubiously Christian. But in fact people sing it and, unknown to me, it touched a chord . . . it's the sort of Christianity I believe in."

Sydney Carter further explained "I see Christ as the incarnation of the piper who is calling us. He dances that shape and pattern which is at the heart of our reality. By Christ I mean not only Jesus; in other times and places, other planets, there may be other Lords of the Dance. But Jesus is the one I know of first and best. I sing of the dancing pattern in the life and words of Jesus".

Village Memories - John Roe

I have memories of a library service at Gladstone Village Hall from around 1945, and hearsay information going back to approximately 1907, when the Hall was first utilised as a part time Library.

In 1946 there was a library room upstairs in part of what is now 'the upper room'. It was at the far end of a corridor, and had a fireplace, three windows for maximum light, and book shelves full of books belonging to the Gladstone Village Hall.

The librarian at that time was a volunteer villager, Miss Patty Mealor, who had been opening the library every Friday afternoon for two hours and had been doing so since 1923 (if not earlier) when the Hall was given to the Village Hall Trustees.

In or around 1947 it was taken over by Neston Library, and their Head Librarian, Miss Daisy Taylor, would be in attendance for the two hour time slot. She would travel on the 103 Crosville bus arriving at the terminus at 13.25, carrying two shopping bags full of 'new exchange books' and be set up and open for 14.00. Dozens of regular subscribers attended, and to those from distant parts of the village it was a social event.

When Miss Taylor retired the new head librarian, Miss Mary Whitehouse, took over, continuing well into the 1960s. However, in the early 1970s the service was replaced by Cheshire Mobile Library Services, and continued as a weekly event into the 1990s.

The mobile service continues to this day and is now on a three weekly cycle.

Spring - such a wonderful time of the year!

Already lovely Galanthus Nivalis (snowdrop) are showing their



pretty white blooms in various clumps in the garden. The first Camellia to flower was the unnamed white. The white blooms contrast so well with the dark green shiny foliage.

Sometimes it is difficult to keep the garden tidy in the early months of the year but it does assist during the hectic time in spring. Many wet leaves have been removed from the borders and the Buddleia Davidii hard pruned. In the autumn two roses were transferred from the large border and to date appear to be settled in their new plot.

Winter Aconites are so lovely with their yellow flowers and green foliage. Some new plants have been purchased and hopefully they will thrive.

The greenhouse has been tidied once again and seed trays etc. filled with compost to warm up (hopefully) awaiting the sowing of the many seeds



including sweet peas which will be sowed in March.

New growth and blooms seem to pop up everywhere and even with the recent cold snap a small clump of yellow crocus have appeared.

Many varieties of birds have visited the garden, i.e. blue, great and long tailed tits, many blackbirds, a pair of robins and once again the brief appearance of the sparrow hawk.

Tasks to be getting on with...

March

- -Fill the seed trays with compost
- Sow seeds and later 'prick out'
- Dead head the Hydrangeas

April

- Weeds will begin to take advantage
- Hand weed new flowers & seedlings
- Hoe between rows in the seedbeds

May

- Attend to tubs and containers, which will soon form a flourishing outdoor display once summer is on the way
