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THE VICAR WRITES



During this period there have been 14,351 wars, large and small, in which an estimated 3.64 billion people have been killed. The value of property destroyed is equal to a gold belt around the world 97.2 miles wide and 33 feet thick. Since 650BC there have been at least 1,656 arms races of which only 16 have not ended in war. The remainder ended in the economic collapse of countries involved. *(figures from 2005 so how much more now!)*

In the Book of Common prayer there is a prayer in which we ask God to:

“Give peace in
our time”

But what do we mean when we pray for peace? Either it's not working or it's something else?

Peace has come to mean the time when there aren't any wars or even any major wars. But in Hebrew peace or *Shalom* means fullness,

having everything you need to be wholly and happily yourself. For Jesus peace seems to have meant not an absence of struggle, but the presence of love.

When the risen Lord Jesus appeared in the upper room to the terrified disciples and said “Peace.”, he wasn't referring to the turmoil of the Roman occupation outside but to their hearts and minds. He brought the fullness of God's love into that room.

Helen Keller wrote:

“I do not want peace that passes all understanding, I want understanding that brings peace.”

Another writer, Marianne Williamson, seemed to suggest that peace is more about what we fill our hearts and minds with:

“fill your mind with meaningless stimuli of a world filled with meaningless things, and it will not be easy to feel peace in your heart.”

Budding young politicians quizzed local MP (May 2017) during school visit.

School pupils from Bishop Wilson Primary School seized the opportunity to quiz a local MP when he made a special visit to the school.

Youngsters from Bishop Wilson School's Council took turns to probe Ellesmere Port and Neston MP Justin Madders on his life as an MP and the demanding work it entails, during a question-and-answer session.

The school invited the MP to join its weekly celebration assembly which sees pupils honoured for their academic and sporting achievements.

Following the assembly, School Council representatives aged from 7 to 11 asked the MP how he had embarked on his political career and whether it was scary to sit in the House of Commons and question the Prime Minister.

The MP talked to the children about his recent work raising the issue of illegal elephant poaching and the international ivory trade and also discussed his career as a local councillor in Ellesmere Port which led him to become an MP.

Pupils also asked whether the MP worked long hours in his job and whether there were ever arguments between politicians trying to reach decisions.



House of Commons

Speaking after the visit, Madders said: "It was great to see such passion and enthusiasm among the children about politics.

"Children have a natural ability to cut to the heart of the matter. They aren't afraid to speak their mind and it's always a pleasure to find out about issues they care about."

The MP was accompanied during his visit by Ron Curnow, Chair of Governors and Rev Cathy Helm.

Headteacher Darren Jones commented: "We're delighted Mr Madders could take time out of his busy schedule to meet our pupils and answer their questions.

"This was a fantastic opportunity for our school council representatives to find out more about the political system and they really enjoyed the experience of putting their local MP on the spot with their pertinent questions."

They made Easter gifts from newspaper to replicate those that would have been given in the





THE GOSPEL WRITERS

This is the second of four articles that look at the writers behind the four gospels in the New Testament.

The Gospel According to St Luke

Luke, the writer of the third gospel was also the author of the Acts of the Apostles. He is linked to Paul as a 'fellow worker' (Philemon 24) and is also described as, 'the beloved physician.' (Col. 4:14) Both of Luke's writings have an introductory dedication to someone called Theophilus, from whom Luke appears to have received patronage for his work. The name 'Theophilus' literally translates as, 'lover of God', which links neatly with the universal appeal of both books.

Luke was a Gentile and has the unique distinction of being the only non-Jewish New Testament writer. He probably wrote his gospel sometime during the last two decades of the first century. Tradition suggests he was part of a Christian church in Antioch. In his introduction to the gospel, Luke acknowledges the existence of a number of sources that were available to him as a gospel writer. One of these was Mark's gospel upon which he draws heavily and often verbatim. Another was, probably, a collection of oral



Key Verses

Chapter 1: 3-4 "So I made a careful study of everything and then decided to write and tell you exactly what took place . . . I have done this to let you know the truth about what you have heard"

One thing to remember about Luke's Gospel: The good news is especially good for the poor and the oppressed.
A 15 minute start: Chapters 1-2, 4, 12, 14-15, 19, 22-24

and written traditions which were also available to Matthew. About two hundred verses, in some form or another, of Luke's gospel can also be found only in Matthew's gospel. Scholars have, not too creatively, identified this source material as 'Q'! Luke's third source appears to have been material known only to him and is unique to his gospel. This material includes Luke's account of the birth of John the Baptist, the witness of the shepherds and the ancient Christian hymns we know as the Magnificat and the Nunc Dimittis.

As a Gentile writer, Luke demonstrates little interest in particularly Jewish matters, though he sees Jesus' birth as part of a divine plan revealed through the Old Testament. He comes across as a keen historian of that time and anchors his gospel in the mainstream of Roman history. However, for Luke, history is just a vehicle of theological interpretation and not an end in itself.

“Blessed are the poor”

Luke has been described as, ‘the gospel of the poor and disadvantaged’. While Matthew writes, “*blessed are the poor in spirit*”, Luke significantly writes, “*blessed are the poor*”. The feeling one has is that this concern for the poor was not just a feature of Luke's gospel but of the Christian community in which he lived.

Luke's gospel is universal and he, alone among the gospel writers, portrays the Samaritans in a favourable light. (Luke 10:25 - 37 and 17:11 – 19) Although Luke puts women in the traditional roles of prayer, almsgiving and supporting the missionary labours of men, he, nevertheless, has a special place for them in his gospel as the interplay

between Mary and Elizabeth in chapter 1 illustrates. Unlike the ending to Mark's gospel, Luke clearly identifies a number of resurrection appearances by Jesus, including the full account of the story of the appearance on the road to Emmaus which is unique to

his gospel. However, Luke goes even further and includes a reference to the Ascension both at the end of his gospel and at the beginning of the Acts of the Apostles.

The gospel of Luke has been called, ‘the loveliest book in the world’. Luke himself has been adopted as the patron saint of both doctors and artists.

Tradition clearly identifies him as a physician while legend suggests he was a skilled painter. There is a portrait of Mary in a Spanish Cathedral which is said to have been painted by him. However, it is as the writer of two books that remind us of the basis and origins of our faith that we shall remember him.

the beauty of thy peace.


Breathe through the heats of our desire

It's ironic that the author of this beautiful and much loved hymn deeply disapproved of singing in church! John Greenleaf Whittier was an American Quaker who firmly believed that God was best worshipped in silent meditation.

Born at Haverhill, Massachusetts in 1807, John

Greenleaf Whittier began life as a farm-boy and shoemaker, and subsequently became a successful journalist, editor and poet. In 1840 he moved to Amesbury, Massachusetts, where most of his poems were written.

In 1884 Whittier allowed the verses to be used in a hymn book. In the United Kingdom the hymn is sung to the tune "Repton" by Hubert Parry. In America the more common tune used is "Rest" by Frederick Charles Maker. However Whittier was never a fan of his own work, saying "I am really not a hymn-writer, for the good reason that I know nothing of music. Only a very few of my pieces were written for singing. A good hymn is the best use to which poetry can be devoted, but I do not claim that I have succeeded in composing one."

GLADSTONE VILLAGE HALL PLAY AREA APPEAL

The Burton Play Area situated behind Gladstone Village Hall next to the bowling green serves the children of Burton and Puddington and for many years was serviced and maintained to appropriate safety standards by Cheshire Council.

Following extensive cost-cutting by the government the council relinquished its support. Gladstone Village Hall, being the owner of the Play Area, had to assume responsibility for it. Monthly independent safety inspections are carried out for which GVH pays several hundred pounds per year. Ground care is now carried out by GVH contractors and where safety issues are flagged up they are attended to by GVH and volunteers.

It became clear from the monthly inspections that the Play Area was increasingly deteriorating and that it would have to be improved or closed.

The community was consulted about the renovation, plans were drawn up with the aid of experts from CWAC and grants were applied for.

Disappointingly there were insufficient approvals. A small grant was obtained from the Rural Support Fund which enabled us, with matching funds from GVH and work in kind from the



Community, to replace the safety surface.

The GVH Committee decided that in the current economic circumstances of the country grants were unlikely to come our way and that GVH and the community would have to renovate the Play Area piecemeal.

Following this, the multi-play unit was condemned as unsafe at a monthly independent inspection and has had to be removed. The Play Area is now much poorer for this.

A replacement for the multi-play unit will cost in the order of £10,000 and we need your help to raise this money. If you would like to join a fund raising committee or even make a donation please contact:

WIRRAL FOODBANK

St Nicholas' Church currently supports Wirral Foodbank through generous donations by our congregation.

Wirral Foodbank is one of the largest in the country. Since its conception in 2011 it has helped 33,842 adults and 18,846 children within the Wirral area. In 2015/16 (April to April) the Foodbank fed and supported 12,261 people of which 4,290 are children. This is an increase of 15% from the previous year.

The reason that people use Foodbanks are varied. Food Vouchers are issued in an emergency to people who are in crisis. They are not, and are not intended to be, a long term solution.

In 2016 the Foodbank started to signpost clients to organisations that could provide support such as **Citizens Advice Wirral**, **Involve North West**, **Energy Projects Plus** and **The St Vincent de Paul Society**.



Representatives from some of these agencies are actually based within some distribution centres so immediate support can be offered.

St Nicholas' Church donated 54.72kgs of food recently and we are fast approaching a total of 2 tonne since the scheme began.

It's Planting Time!

It is a very busy time of the year with the usual gardening and greenhouse tasks.

Currently the greenhouse is full of seedlings, the last box is still to be pricked out as soon as possible.

As usual Larkspur was the last to germinate and is way behind the Butterfly Mix and Cosmos already being hardened off. With the cold weather the boxes of seeds in the greenhouse are covered with newspaper overnight.

The sweet peas are growing on strongly but one variety did not germinate well, the variety being Lauren Louise. The others: Mrs R Chisholm – white, Ava Elizabeth – lavender, Bonny Galloway – scarlet and Hannah Rachel – pink; are fine. The camellia – Lady Macon – which was transplanted from our previous property was full of blooms and has taken 14 years to achieve this.

The white Camellia once ceasing flowering has been taken out of the tub and planted in the garden. The Rhododendrons have been beautiful.

The dahlias were left in-situ over the winter and hopefully, will grow into healthy plants.

Not many birds have visited recently. However blue, great and long tailed tits; a pair of robins and one or two blackbirds have been seen.

A wonderful sight was a goldfinch with a beak full of cobwebs which was presumably for a nest.
