Why do we decorate our Christmas Trees?

The Christmas tree became popular in England around 1840 when Queen Victoria's husband Prince Albert brought a tree over from Germany and put it up at Windsor Castle. The Royal couple were captured in a newspaper standing around the tree with their family and ever since the practice became fashionable and a great tradition.

Christmas trees were first decorated with candles to remind people of the stars in the sky at the time of Jesus' birth. With the advent of electricity, coloured lights replaced the candles. Trees were also decorated with sweets hung by ribbons. The first tree ornaments went on sale at Woolworths in 1880.

And today we still like to place an Angel on the top of the tree as a reminder of the Angel that brought the shepherds glad tidings of the birth of Jesus.

THE VICAR WRITES

When I first suggested to my mum that I was thinking about what could be done for a 'blue Christmas' she was really quite shocked, until I explained that 'blue' meant feeling sad or down and not something rude!

I love Christmas and New Year, the family traditions, carols, mince pies and people coming together to celebrate the birth of a tiny baby boy born to poor parents in a Palestinian backwater. A birth which should have gone unnoticed; but a birth which has changed history and the lives of countless people.

For some people, Christmas can be lonely or something to just get through. For others, the absence of loved ones is often felt more keenly and the thought of a New Year just brings dread.

Perhaps for Mary and Joseph, at that first Christmas, their feelings were pretty much the same - they were far from home, surrounded by the scent of scandal. Not welcomed by the people of Bethlehem, they probably just wanted to get through this time safely and without any fuss. Mary must have been terrified to be away from her family at such a vulnerable time, as she gave birth in an animal shelter.

It was in their vulnerability that God gave them signs and assurances of his blessing and love. Shepherds came to visit them with news of angels - all because their baby was the promised Messiah.

Centuries of traditions and celebrations have meant we've lost touch with the rawness of Mary and Joseph's situation. The excitement of waiting to see what the John Lewis advert will be has eclipsed the way God reached down amongst the poorest of humanity and blessed them with a baby whose name means 'God with us'. Jesus brings hope into our lives, especially at Christmas. He gives us the assurance that we don't have to begin the New Year alone if we trust in Him.

God is with us whether we're feeling fine or simply can't wait for the year to end.

The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

[John 1:5]

Are there practical things we can do to help those for whom Christmas may be 'blue'? A friendly invite, an offer of company, a promise to pray or an offer to just listen and 'be with'.

Thinking of those who will be wondering how they can feed their family over Christmas perhaps check out the Christmas wish list for the Foodbank and donate extra.

Bring a present for a child to the '**Carols Round the Tree'** service on Christmas eve which go to the Charles Thompson Mission in Birkenhead.

May I wish you a Christmas where you know God's presence in the gift of his Son and that the light he brings will journey with you into the New Year.

When talking to clients at the Foodbank recently, I have been embarrassed to realise that providing them with three days' emergency food supply was ignoring their main needs. Of course, knowing that you will be able to eat for the next few days is very important, but it was obvious that these people needed someone to advise them on how to apply for financial help, to speak on their behalf to officials, or to guide them on ways of reducing their debts. Like most Foodbank volunteers, I had neither the experience nor the training to give them this kind of help. Unfortunately, I also had very little idea of where to suggest they looked for the advice and support they needed.

What we call 'sign-posting' has rightly become an increasingly important part of what we do as Foodbank volunteers, but whereas some volunteers have a good knowledge of where to point people to find the help they need, many of us do not.



So the Trustees have now decided that we will concentrate on signposting to three organisations: Energy Project Plus, Citizens Advice Wirral and Involve Northwest.

Posters and leaflets giving the contact details for these organisations will soon be made available to all Distribution Centres. Even though the help we ourselves give is short-term and limited, we will also be able to point people in the right direction to get more long-term guidance


and help in handling the difficulties they face. This will bring us closer to fulfilling our vision of ending




hunger and poverty in our area.

Rev Colin Hart Chairman of Trustees In 2016 between January and October, Wirral Foodbank fed and supported 9,849 people, including 3,275 children. This was an increase of 18% on the previous year.

42% of all food donated to Wirral Foodbank comes from local Churches – its biggest contributor!

The chair of the all-party House of Commons Work and Pensions Committee, Frank Field, MP for Birkenhead, recently highlighted the plight of families waiting to receive the new universal benefit. An extra 15 tonnes of supplies is required to enable Wirral Foodbank to manage the expected explosion in demand in the run up to Christmas

He said that the waiting time for the new benefit would push many families 'to the brink of destitution' in the run-up to Christmas.

Frank Field went on to say in a recent Commons debate that the main foodbank in Birkenhead was looking to acquire an extra 15 tonnes of supplies to enable it to manage the expected explosion in demand in the run up to Christmas.

Wirral Foodbank wish to thank all at St Nicholas' Church for its continued support.

The choir's voices include soprano, alto, tenor and bass ranges, as well as counter-tenors and female tenors.

The Liverpool Renaissance Singers regularly give recitals in the Lady Chapel of Liverpool Cathedral, typically in December and March. They also make a number of other appearances, within local churches and other secular venues in the North West as well as farther afield. Only between eight and ten recitals are given each year so the parish is very fortunate to welcome them back for a return visit.

HYMN STORIES

Hark! The herald angels sing Glory to the new-born King!

Peace on earth and mercy mild God and sinners reconciled! Joyful, all ye nations rise Join the triumph of the skies; With the angelic host proclaim Christ is born in Bethlehem! Hark! The herald angels sing Glory to the new-born King!

Christ, by highest heaven adored Christ, the everlasting Lord; Late of time behold him come Offspring of the Virgin's womb. Veiled in flesh the Godhead see; Hail the incarnate Deity Pleased as man with man to dwell; Jesus, our Emmanuel! Hark! The herald angels sing Glory to the new-born King!

Mild he lays his glory by, Born that man no more may die. Born to raise the sons of earth Born to give them second birth. Risen with healing in his wings Light and life to all he brings Hail the Sun of Righteousness! Hail the heaven-born Prince of Peace! Hark! The herald angels sing Glory to the new-born King!



One of Charles Wesley's most famous hymns, the carol was written in 1738.

Charles Wesley, brother to cleric John Wesley and together with fellow cleric George Whitefield founded the Methodist movement. It was John Wesley's sermons that swayed the minds of people in England – but today it is the hymns of Charles that are sung throughout the land.

"Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" is a Christmas carol that first appeared in 1739 in the collection Hymns and Sacred Poems, Wesley had requested and received slow and solemn music for his lyrics, not the joyful tune expected today. Moreover, Wesley's original opening couplet was:

Hark! How all the welkin rings, Glory to the King of Kings

The popular modern version is the result of alterations made by various hands, notably by Wesley's co-worker George Whitefield who changed the opening couplet to the familiar one we know today and by Felix Mendelssohn.

In 1840—a hundred years after the publication of Hymns and Sacred Poems—Mendelssohn composed a cantata to Gutenberg's invention of the printing press. It is music from this cantata, adapted by the English musician William Cummings to fit the lyrics of 'Hark! The Herald Angels Sing', which forms the words and music of the carol we know today.



THE ONSET OF WINTER

Dodging showers and gales were the norm whilst attempting to prepare the garden for winter.

All the tubs and pots have now been stripped out and replanted with spring flowering bulbs. There is a small border at the rear of the greenhouse which was in great need of attention. A large Rosemary bush was removed together with masses of Lily-of-the-Valley which have now been planted in different parts of the garden.

Compost was added to the border and this was planted up with spring flowering bulbs. The small short path was also much neglected and the same has been cleaned (husbands can be very useful!) .

The Sedum Maximum and Skimmia are now flowering and add colour to the garden. So too do the Hydrangea

heads which have donned their autumn colours. These will soon make lovely arrangements and decorations indoors.

The geraniums will shortly

be brought indoors so that they will hopefully survive the winter months. Any tall roses have been reduced by one-third to save any wind rock affecting their roots. Buff Beauty and Rosa Mundi have been slightly trimmed as they were both growing wild.

Many birds have returned to the garden feeders: Blue, Great and Long-tailed Tits; Robins; sometimes

a lone Jay in early morning; and of course Jenny Wren, often heard and less frequently seen!



Tasks to be getting on with:

- Divide congested clumps of herbaceous perennials
- ¤ Finish planting spring flowering bulbs
- Clear fallen leaves off flower beds if conditions are wet
- Check any bulbs, corms, tubers and bare root plants for damage or rot.
- Start eating those stored vegetables and think about planting more winter squash next year.
