LENT 2018

What is Lent?

Lent is the period of time in the church calendar that starts with Ash Wednesday spans Good Friday and ends with Easter Sunday.

Ash Wednesday commemorates the

beginning of Jesus' 40-day fasting and temptation in the desert, Good Friday symbolises Christ's crucifixion and Easter



Sunday commemorates Jesus' resurrection from the grave after his crucifixion

Lent is generally observed as a time for Christian reflection and prayer as a way of preparing for Easter. It is commonly observed by many Christian denominations - Anglican, Catholic, Lutheran, Methodist and many more.

Christians from all theological persuasions typically choose to observe Lent as a way of focusing their thoughts on Jesus Christ during the Easter period.


During Lent St Nicholas' Church, along with other churches in the area, will be running a Lent Course for those who wish to join millions of people around the world who will be setting a short time aside to reflect on what Easter means.

St Nicholas Church Lent Course

This year St Nicholas' Church will once again be joining with other churches from 'Neston District Churches Together' to host an ecumenical Lent

group. We will be using The York Course called 'On the Third Day'.

The resurrection is the Big Story that turned a little Jewish protest movement into a world-transforming religion.



And yet by Easter Monday we've almost forgotten about it and are planning our summer holidays.

How can we re-capture the explosive power of the resurrection that ricocheted around the world? How can we live in the glow of resurrection and be an Easter people? How can 'there and then' become 'here and now'?

There are five sessions, each of which will be held at The Vicarage on Tuesday evenings at 8.00pm starting on 20 February and on Wednesday evenings at 8.00pm at Danes Court, Mudhouse Lane starting on 21 February. The sessions are:

- 1. Have I Got News for You!
- 2. So What? The implications of the Resurrection
- 3. 'Let him Easter in us'
- 4. Celebrating and Praying Easter
- 5. A Risen Church

Everyone is welcome to come along either for all or even just one of the group sessions.

THE PASSION FLOWER

'Christ's Passion' is the short final period in the life of Jesus covering his entrance visit to Jerusalem and leading to his crucifixion on Calvary. It defines the climactic event of crucifixion which is central to Christianity.

This flower is a symbol of Christ's Passion and Cross, including his scourging, crowning with thorns, three nails and five wounds.



In the 15th and 16th Centuries Spanish missionaries adopted this plant as symbols of the last days of Jesus, and especially his crucifixion:

- The pointed tips represent the lance in Jesus's side as he died on the Cross
- The tendrils represent the whips used
- The ten petals represent the Jesus' ten faithful apostles (12 less St Peter who denied him and Judas who betrayed him)
- The flowers radial filaments represent the crown of thorns
- The 3 stigmata represent the 3 nails
- The 5 anthers below them the 5 wounds (four by nails and one by lance)
- The blue and white colours represent heaven and purity

CONFIRMATION SERVICE

29 April, 6.30pm

This year we have the Bishop Keith Sinclair, Bishop of Birkenhead coming to take our Confirmation service.

It is a service which gives a person the opportunity to confirm the promises that were made when they were baptized. If you were baptized as a child and godparents made those promises on your behalf, it's your opportunity to 'own' those for yourself and acknowledge that you are ready to continue on your journey of faith in committing to follow Jesus Christ and take part in church life.

At the service there is also opportunity for those who have not been baptized to be baptized and confirmed and for those who may wish to renew their commitment to Jesus, there is an opportunity for that too. All those who come will be there to support you and to promise to pray for you as you continue to grow in your faith and discipleship.

A Confirmation Service is a wonderful high point in the life of a church as we see people of all ages make a stand for their faith in God and to receive God's assurance of being with them as they continue through life and all that it brings. Bishop Keith reckons the oldest person he has Confirmed was in their late eighties!



NATURE WATCH WITH RSPB

For all of us at the RSPB Dee Estuary reserve 2017 was a year to remember, perhaps most notably for the retirement of our long-serving site manager, Colin Wells. Colin worked for the RSPB for 42 years in total and had been at the Dee since 1984, an incredible career in nature conservation and quite a legacy he leaves here in the shape of Burton Mere Wetlands.

It's quite fitting then, that 2017 will also we remembered for the first successful breeding of a single pair of rare cattle egrets in the established colony of their cousins, the little egrets, in the treetops of Marsh Covert adjacent to Burton Mere Wetlands. Most people recognise cattle egrets from nature documentaries, stalking alongside rhinos and wildebeests on the African plains, and prior to last year there were only two previous breeding successes in the UK – so their arrival is a great testament to the substantial wetland creation we have done over the years here at Burton to attract them to the Dee.

This last autumn and winter we have seen the return of all the usual variety of wildfowl, wading birds and birds of prey; pink-footed geese have passed the 7,000 mark which is a little lower than last winter but still hugely significant, whilst a flock of over 40 whooper swans — winter migrants from Iceland - have graced the estuary since November.

Amongst the birds of prey, hen harriers are the undoubted stars and are seen most days hunting over the marsh between Burton and Parkgate, including two stunning adult males of these increasingly rare raptors. A better chance of seeing them is during a 10 metre spring tide, when we run events at Parkgate to showcase the unfolding drama; dates this year are Friday 2 February, Saturday 3 and Sunday 4 March.

Arguably the real highlight of the past three months has been the emergence of a kingfisher seen most days and at times at close proximity and for prolonged periods, from the Marsh Covert hide, a gentle stroll from Burton Mere Wetlands' visitor reception. Some fantastic photos are being shared by visitors on our social media sites, but nothing beats trying your luck to see it in the flesh, so why not come for a wander around soon?

We're well past the shortest day now and It won't be too long before we start seeing some of our summer visitors return; avocets are normally back at Burton Mere Wetlands in mid-February, but remarkably one hardy individual has been with us right until the end of December, and may become the first avocet to spend an entire winter up here on the Dee.

It seems a long way off yet, but remember 'Mum's Go Free' at Burton Mere Wetlands on Mother's Day, Sunday 11 March, if you're looking for a pleasant day out with the family.

Colin's successor, Graham Jones, joins us from a regional role in the RSPB's Lancaster office, and having started in the role just before Christmas, will be settling in properly over the coming weeks and months, so be sure to give him a friendly Burton welcome if you see him when you visit the reserve.

Women's World Day of Prayer is a

worldwide movement of Christian women who come together to observe a common day of prayer held on the first Friday in March each year. The service for 2018 has been written by Christian women of Suriname, a country in South America: their theme is 'All God's Creation is Very Good'.

On 2 March 2018, prayer throughout the world will begin as dawn breaks over the islands of Tonga in the Pacific, and will continue across each continent until the last services are held once more back in the Pacific, on the islands of Samoa. This wave of prayer, encircling the world, lasts for about 36 hours.

Our local services will be held in the afternoon at St Nicholas'

Church, Burton; and in the evening, at Neston Methodist Church. The service has been translated into more than 60 languages and 1,000 dialects; so that on the 2 March, women throughout the world can all sing and pray together, quite literally from the same hymn sheet! It's quite a feat.



February brings rain that thaws the frozen lake again,

March brings breezes, loud and shrill, to stir the dancing daffodil

A successful gardening year has unfolded – fingers crossed! The shoots of the lovely spring flowering bulbs are already showing their green spears through the dark earth (at the time of writing).

Of all the spring bulbs the Galanthus Nivalis (snowdrops) are soon to appear and are such a joy to

be seen from the kitchen window on a dull day.

The Eryngium (sea holly) seems to have survived the winter but this year the beautiful blue stalks died down rather quickly. The skimmia and purple and white flowering Hebe continued to bloom throughout the winter giving much needed colour to the garden. The rockery needs some attention again but soon crocus should be in full bloom.

There are several clumps of winter aconites and these are such lovely flowers with their yellow blooms surrounded with a collar of green leaves.

The sweet pea seeds should be sown around 16 March, namely

Florence Court, Kippen Cream, John Adie, Hannah Rachel, Bristol and an old variety Anniversary.



The geraniums which over-wintered indoors seem to have survived as have several cuttings.

Many different varieties of birds have frequented the garden. Blue,

WIRRAL FOODBANK

The work of Wirral Foodbank continues. In 2017, we distributed 109 tons of food, and fed and supported 11,271 local people in crisis. Of this number, 3,527 were children.

Over the Christmas period, we were overwhelmed, 'in more ways than one' with the generosity of the people of Wirral. An amazing 27 tons of food was donated in the last three weeks of December, an increase of 36% on the same period last year. Thank you to all our donors.

In the months ahead we face some uncertainty as to how the introduction of full Universal Credit will affect the people of Wirral. Trussell Trust has reported that Foodbanks in areas of full Universal Credit have seen an average increase of 30% six months after rollout compared to a year before. We recognise the valuable support of the local DWP team with whom we have been working closely, along with other agencies, to ensure that any issues are identified early.
