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# What's the Word?

## Lent, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday & Easter Day

Easter commemorates the resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is the most important Christian festival, and the one celebrated with the greatest joy. Without Easter there would be no Christianity. Without Jesus' suffering, his execution and subsequent resurrection there would be no Christianity, for however terrible the suffering was, it was part of God's plan for the salvation of humankind.

In Western Christianity, Easter marks the end of Lent, a period of fasting and penitence in preparation for Easter, which begins on Ash Wednesday and lasts forty days (not counting Sundays).

The week before Easter, known as Holy Week, is very special in the Christian tradition. The Sunday before Easter is Palm Sunday and the days immediately before Easter Day (Sunday) are Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday respectively commemorate Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, the Last Supper and the Crucifixion.

## 'It is Finished'

The words **'It is Finished'** are found only in John's Gospel, (19:28 and 19:30) and these are the only two places in the New Testament where it occurs.

Verse 28 "After this, when Jesus knew that all things were now completed, in order that the scripture might be fulfilled, he said, 'I thirst.'"

Verse 30 "Then when he received the sour wine Jesus said, 'It is finished,' and he bowed his head and gave up his spirit."

These are said to be the last words of Christ on the Cross.

#### THE VICAR WRITES

Would you believe that there is an official job called a 'penguinologist' or a job 'to be in charge of

the big door' and 'shredded cheese expert'. However, my favourite job description is when an American TV station listed Prince Harry as the "Prince of whales'!

What kind of title or identity do we give ourselves? Do we define ourselves by our employment, family status, social status, sexuality, nationality? If you are ever asked who you are, how do you reply? Would you say...I'm a wife, mum, vicar, teacher, daughter, sister, friend, UK citizen, Christian, dog owner, car owner, cook, household technician, a member of WWF, or a chocolate expert?

Of course the reply would largely depend upon the context in which it was asked. Whilst all of these are true for me and part of what makes me, me, they don't define who I am. For me the most important is that I am a child of God. From that starting point all the other 'labels' are blessings and out workings of the gifts, abilities and chromosomes that God has given to me and could change. My identity is found in who I am in Christ Jesus, for it is he that has made me and by accepting that status as



child of God it allows me to become all that God formed me for. Right at the beginning of John's gospel [1: 12] we read:

## 'Yet to all who received him, to all who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God!'

With calls to 'be who you want to be', to 'define yourself and not be defined by others' and identity being seen to be 'fluid', it's not surprising life gets confusing. No wonder so many become disillusioned and opt out to 'find themselves'. Virginia Woolf famously wrote,' it's much more important to be yourself than anyone else.' Yet how much energy is wasted in trying to be someone else?

Psalm 139 is a beautiful piece of poetry that celebrates the intimate way in which God knows each one of us. 'For you created my inner most being, you knit me together in my mother's womb'. If my identity is secure in knowing that I am God's child, deeply loved and precious in his sight, that means I don't have to worry so much about trying to be a perfect wife, mum, vicar etc. (something I'm afraid to say is not possible this side of heaven!) because it's not about me alone, trying my best to be the best. Because I am God's child, He will help me become the best I can be in all these roles and opportunities that are open before me.

We are all unique and have our own God given gifts and abilities, personality make up and genes, even identical twins aren't exactly the same in everything. God promises in Isaiah 49: 15:

'Can a mother forget the baby at her breast and have no compassion on the baby she has borne? Though she may forget, I will not forget you.'

And, St Augustine wrote:

'God loves each of us... as if there were only one of us.'

#### SPRING NATURE WATCH WITH RSPB

The avocets, one of our key breeding birds here, made their usual return in small numbers in mid-February, and by April we should have around the fifty pairs which nested here last year, most of them right in front of the Reception Hide making for close and easy viewing.

The herons and egrets are already nest-building and April is the best time to witness them in the treetops, before the buds bloom and leave us to just enjoy the unusual gurgling sounds of the colony. Will we see the cattle egrets, one of our biggest successes of last year, nest again? There is at least one of them currently around the reserve, so watch this space!

Another spring spectacle is the unmissable bluebell carpet of Gorse Covert woodland which greets visitors as they arrive at the reserve from Puddington Lane. The best four weeks of colour are usually mid-April to mid-May, though the recent cold spell may have held things back slightly. We have two exciting "Bluebells and Birdsong" guided walks to showcase the woodland plants amidst the beautiful soundtrack of the nesting songbirds, taking place on Wednesday 25 and Sunday 29 April. Booking is essential so please get in touch if you wish to join in.

Speaking of birdsong, the famous dawn chorus becomes a feature in May; International Dawn Chorus Day is the first Sunday of the month, and as always we host a guided walk to showcase the phenomenon at Burton Mere Wetlands. Not for the faint-hearted, but the 5.00am start is well worth it to experience the reserve waking up at first light, with a crescendo of birdsong as each different species sparks into tune.

In a similar vein but a slightly later start, a week later (Sunday 13 May) our "Birdsong and Breakfast" walk takes in the different array of breeding birds along the Burton Marsh Greenway, finishing at Nets Café for breakfast.

As well as residents like skylarks and meadow pipits, the walk's guide will track down various freshly-arrived warblers, swallows and martins and even birds passing through like Wheatears. As the weather warms up we'll see not only a burst of colour from flowers, but also the great range of flying insects – butterflies, dragonflies, damselflies and some lesser-known mini-beasts – vying for your attention as you wander around Burton Mere Wetlands' trails, and on really sunny days the common lizards will start basking on their favourite fences.

So take advantage of the improving weather and wander down for a visit; remember, you can now enjoy a delicious fresh sandwich here, supplied by *The Village Bakehouse & Deli* in Little Neston, along with a hot or cold drink and various snacks – everything you need for a spring picnic!

#### HYMN STORIES

#### 'STAND UP, STAND UP FOR JESUS'

Stand up, stand up, for Jesus, Ye soldiers of the cross; Lift high His royal banner, It must not suffer loss: From victory unto victory, His army shall He lead, Till every foe is vanquished, And Christ is Lord indeed.

Stand up, stand up, for Jesus, The trumpet call obey; Forth to the mighty conflict, In this His glorious day: Ye who are men, now serve Him, Against unnumbered foes; Let courage rise with danger, And strength to strength oppose.

Stand up, stand up, for Jesus, Stand in His strength alone; The arm of flesh will fail you, Ye dare not trust your own: Put on the gospel armour Each piece put on with prayer; Where duty calls, or danger, Be never wanting there.

Stand up, stand up, for Jesus, The strife will not belong; This day the noise of battle, The next, the victor's song: To him who over-cometh, A crown of life shall be; He, with the King of glory, Shall reign eternally.



Rev. George Duffield, Jr.

This hymn of American origin and synonymous with the abolition of slavery and the American Civil War was composed by George Duffield Jr in 1858 following the death of his friend Rev. Dudley A Tyng – an anti-slavery preacher.

In 1858 revival was taking place in Philadelphia. The movement grew out of midday prayer meetings coordinated by the Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA). Rev. Dudley A. Tyng, a young Episcopalian minister, soon came to be recognised as its leader.

Though there was some controversy over his anti-slavery preaching, Tyng was known for his strong commitment to God. Among the interdenominational leaders who gathered around him was the Presbyterian minister George Duffield, Jr. On Tuesday 13 April 1858 Rev. Tyng was studying at his country home when he went to the barn to check on his mule which was driving a machine that shelled corn. As he patted the animal, the sleeve of his gown got caught in the cogs of the machine, and his arm was severely injured. The arm had to be amputated, the wound became infected, and Tyng died the following week.

Before he died, however, he was asked by friends if there were any messages he had for those who had participated with him in the revival work. Tyng responded briefly, beginning with the words, "Tell them, let us all stand up for Jesus."

In the days and events following Tyng's death, these final words were invoked several times to all who had been inspired by him.

When George Duffield, Jr. preached to his own congregation the next week, he focused on Ephesians 6:14,

## "Stand therefore, having fastened on the belt of truth..."

He concluded his sermon with a hymn he had written. It began with the line, "Stand up, stand up for Jesus."

The hymn was soon picked up by Presbyterian and Congregationalist publishers, and it quickly became an established work.

## Springtime

A most beautiful time of the year!

Once again the white Camellia was first to bloom with Felice Harris

ad Lady Macon (pink). To date daffodils are still awaited: King Alfred, Tête-à-Tête, and Cheerfulness Minnow to name but a few.



The tulips in bloom are eagerly awaited. The brown florets on the Hydrangeas will be trimmed off and hopefully many buds on same will appear.

A small border which contained six Lavender bushes has been cleared as they had become very 'leggy'. They could well be replaced with roses and a Kilmarnock (weeping willow). A Ceanothus (Californian Lilac) has been planted in a space in the large border.

Some Dahlias were left in the ground covered over with masses of grass cuttings so hopefully they will survive the cold snaps. With the Sweet Pea seed sown when the seedlings appear and four true leaves show, the tops will be pinched out to promote sturdy seedlings. They will be 'hardened off' when strong enough, prior to planting out.

The rockery is always a problem and needs urgent attention. The roses have now been pruned and their new growth awaited.

Many birds have visited the garden, especially during the very

cold snaps. A lone Jay visits daily and a pair of great tits are again inspecting the bird box –



will they rent it for nesting?
