Local Churches support for local communities ...and vice versa.


Only a couple of years ago two reports on the value of church social initiatives amongst local communities were published. The reports highlighted the role many churches play within their local communities in supporting people with social, domestic or financial need.

The findings concluded that if the value of this input in terms of resources were to be fully costed including volunteers' time (some of which is quite specialist) and if paid at only the level of an average wage of around £500 per week or £12.50 per hour, then the value to the UK would be around £1.9bn. And, if the use of facilities and direct financial contribution were to be added in, the total value is estimated to be £2.5bn per annum.

The reports suggested that the increase in provision of these services by churches is founded on their desire to serve their local communities and their compassion and awareness of local needs. Fundamentally they concluded that churches deliver social action because the Bible calls them to do so and it is a practical way of demonstrating God's love and blessing towards others.

But within a community a church itself also benefits from the skills, talents, financial resources and professional input of church members and its local people.

Church Tower Renovation Completed



As many people from around the parish will have noticed, the scaffolding went up, the work to repair the church tower was completed and the scaffolding came down... all in time for the Easter church services and the weddings.

The work included new timber louvres to the bell tower, damaged stonework was cut out and replaced, sandstone repointed and lead work repaired. All of this could not have been achieved without the support and generosity of church members together with a financial input from 'The Friends of St Nicholas' Church' towards the total cost of some £24,000.

For many people in Burton and Puddington as well as outlying areas, the church plays an important part within society and the local community. As a consequence the preservation of the church building is essential in ensuring that village life can continue. Thank YOU!

We cannot control Him; the art of following is the opposite of control. He is all in all, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; He is the journey and the journey's end.'

Do I want to follow a God who can be controlled? Or the God I know I can rely on not to be swayed by the latest trends or by my latest whim, but is consistent in love, mercy, grace and forgiveness.

There may be times I wish I could control Him but what a disaster that would be for everyone else! It is counter intuitive to submit yourself to the will of another, but that's what following Jesus involves.


After the Easter holiday all of our classes visited the RSPB to look at the birds in preparation for an art

Sponsorship in aid of Vestry Improvements & Meeting Room

In July Linda Jones will be embarking on a sponsored walk along the West Highland Way in Scotland. The walk is 96 miles long starting from Milngavie just north of Glasgow and finishing about a week later in the Scottish Highlands at Fort William.

Later this year St Nicholas' Church hopes to be able to complete the refurbishment of the existing vestry area to create a much needed Vestry Meeting Room with its own small kitchen and independent heating system. This will help facilitate the Youth Church activities, enable meetings to be held, offer space for refreshments to be prepared, and allow the Vicar, Churchwardens and others to meet without the necessity to heat the whole of the church. It will be a great benefit to the efficiency and usefulness of the church. The overall cost is likely to be around £30,000.

As part of the refurbishment appeal, all funds raised by Linda Jones through this sponsorship will be donated to the project. So, from 20p a mile to £1 a mile or simply a straightforward donation, every pound raised will help...every step of the way!

VESTRY IMPROVEMENTS & MEETING ROOM APPEAL

Plans are afoot to provide much needed additional space to hold small meetings and to improve the area of the Vestry to make it more efficient and usable.

In conjunction with church architect Steve Quicke proposals have been drawn up to make the area of the Vestry more economically usable and more efficient. Approval of the scheme is expected from Chester Diocese and it is hoped that the work can be completed by late Autumn.

In essence, the scheme for a revamped Vestry and Meeting Room will provide a revised layout of the room, better insulation, a small kitchen area, independent heating, efficient storage and space to hold small meetings. It will provide facilities for 'Sunday School' to meet as well as space to hold small meetings without the necessity to heat the whole of the church.

Along with donations, sponsorship and offers of support the PCC has already received pledges of around £5,000 towards the likely overall cost of circa £30,000.

In the coming months there will be opportunities for church members, Friends of St Nicholas' Church and others to become involved in the Appeal. If you would like to help raise the necessary funds you may do so either by cheque or direct donation to:

PARISH FINANCE

Extract from the 2017 Annual Report and Accounts presented to the St Nicholas' Church Annual Parochial Church Meeting in April.

The PCC wishes to place on record its grateful thanks to all those who support the church financially and in particular those who give regularly to the church through planned giving, those who support the church building and churchyard through the Friends of St Nicholas' Church, those who have made single sum donations and those who attend fund-raising events.

The surplus of income over expenditure for the year was £36,153. However, during the year the PCC received special donations totalling £21,021. Without this additional income, together with the reduction in Parish Share by £6,363 and a reduction in Outward Giving of £7,337 (compared with 2016), the accounts of the PCC would show only a small surplus of £1,432. Also, an additional source of income in the year has been donations from The Friends of St Nicholas Church.

The most significant item of expenditure for the church is the contribution of £50,114 made to Chester Diocese i.e. the 'Parish Share' for ministry (the Vicar) and related costs. The amount paid to the Diocese in 2017 was reduced in 2017 compared with 2016 (£56,477) due to a reapportionment of shared costs between Burton and Shotwick and the PCC's decision to contribute to the Diocese at a reduced rate.

Frances Ridley Havergal



Frances Ridley Havergal was a Christian devotional writer, poetess, hymn writer and musician who was born December 14, 1836, into a cultured, religious family at Astley, Worcestershire, England. She was the youngest child of William Henry Havergal, a Church of England minister and noted poet and church musician who authored about 100 hymns.

At the age of 3 Frances Havergal could read; at the age of 4, she began reading and memorizing the Bible; at 7 she began writing verse. When she was eleven, her mother died after a long period of suffering.

Educated at home and in private schools in Worcester in England, and in Dusseldorf, Germany (1852-53), her scholastic achievements included proficiency in several modern languages, in addition to Latin, Greek, and Hebrew.

Frances Havergal had a thorough training in linguistics and music and was also a pianist and singer. She was also a devoted Bible student, memorising the New Testament as well as the Psalms, Isaiah, and the Minor Prophets.

Her hymn of consecration, '*Take My Life* and Let It Be' was written by Frances Havergal in 1874.

SUMMER SPECTACLES AT BURTON MERE WETLANDS

After a brief glimpse of promise in mid-April, the weather still hadn't quite reached its anticipated spring feel but sunny days with plenty of opportunities to venture outdoors have now arrived..

The unsettled weather has undoubtedly held back nature's timetable; the bluebells were a good week later to bloom than the past couple of years, resident birds were later to nest and the arrival of spring migrants such as warblers, swallows and martins was notably slow.

Despite that, the bluebells were as spectacular as ever and we've seen a record number of avocets settle on the wetlands, with a whopping 155 the current highest count, well up on last year's 121. At the time of writing, it is too early to say how many pairs have nested, but we will soon have a good feel for the number of nests, and many of the chicks will have hatched and be probing around the shallow waters for food, with parents close by keeping a keen eye to fend off any lurking predators overhead.

A short walk along the main nature trail will bring you to the bustling colony of herons and little egrets in the treetops of Marsh Covert woodland. We're currently trying to determine whether we have the rarer cattle egret nesting again. There is at least one bird around but it is often difficult to see exactly what is happening amongst the branches and leaves.

Warmer weather will drive the emergence of much of the non-bird wildlife that calls Burton Mere Wetlands home; butterflies, dragonflies and damselflies will soon decorate the paths and pools with colour, along with the magnificent orchids which thrive across the wet ground.

For those who like flowers, we have an Orchids and Wildflowers guided walk on Wednesday 20 June, to gain expert knowledge during a gentle stroll around the reserve's trails. Or, if you prefer more general insight into the reserve and its inhabitants, our Wildlife Wanders focus on everything from the history to the future plans, plus pointing out anything that shows its face that day. Four of these walks are planned for June and July; see our website for dates and details.

One recent exciting development is the opening of the mature garden at the rear of Burton Mere House, making a short but picturesque extension to the visitor paths and a peaceful spot to sit and relax or enjoy a picnic. We will be gradually improving the garden to demonstrate how we can all give nature a home where we live through the way we manage our own garden or outdoor space.

Speaking of the house, in mid-April we welcomed our first residential volunteers, Alice and Gwen, who will be with us for six months gaining all-round experience of the reserve operation with a view to setting them up well for a career in nature conservation. Be sure to give them a warm welcome if you see them next time you're down here.

PLANTING TIME LEADS TO SUMMER

With the recent mini heat-wave the garden exploded with colour. Daffodils followed by muscari, tulips, violets and the beautiful forget-me-not flowers.

New lavender bushes have been planted in the small border and a new rosemary bush has been planted



to replace the established one which was caught by frost.

Of course, the greenhouse has been a



hive of activity and space was at a premium as the sweet peas were slow to germinate and hardened off. Broad beans, Larkspur and one variety of sweet

peas failed to germinate.

The rhododendrons are about to burst into bloom as well as lilacs. The ceanothus (Californian Lilac) is not growing on too well. Unfortunately ground elder in the small shrubbery is again causing problems and has to be pulled out by the long roots. The many tubs and pots have been cleared of their bulbs, washed and filled with compost to await the planting up of annuals.

Many birds have visited the garden and great and blue tits have inspected the two bird boxes. Will they decide to take out a tenancy? A pair of robins are very

aggressive and have taken a great dislike to the sparrows!



Tasks to be getting on with...

- · Dead head daffodils
- Dead head roses
- Continue weeding

Remember to water...

Watering is essential as the weather warms up. Give your garden a big drink once or twice a week to draw plant roots deeper into the nutritious soil. Containers and hanging baskets will need watering once a day – perhaps twice a day if it is hot and windy. For larger shrubs and trees, leave a hose dribbling around the base for an hour.

So, relax and admire the garden - weather permitting!
