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# What's the Word?

## Socio Economic Status ...it denotes who we are, where we live and how we earn a living.

Standard UK socio-economic classifications are used by Chester Diocese to rank each of its parishes according to the proportions of people living there with professional or managerial jobs, as compared with other types of employment.

There are three critical components relating to socio-economic status (SES) - education, occupation and income. The overriding influence is occupation but with the UK population heading for one-third 'retired' (i.e. not in employment) the rationale for classifying people by occupation has been called into question. Such classification is deemed by many to be far too blunt an instrument to demonstrate a person's contribution to society.

Whatever the shortcomings of socioeconomic classification the parish of St Nicholas is amongst the more affluent areas of Cheshire and other parts of the UK. However, finding a more suitable measurement to denote 'worth' and 'ability to contribute to society' remains a challenge.

Wherever we look around our local area, people and organisations continue to seek help and resources for very worthwhile projects and all kinds of charitable and social causes that demand our attention.

And, within what is a relatively affluent society, today many of these causes are experiencing demands which place a significant burden on their ability to function as well as on the local population.

For many years St Nicholas' Church has struggled to meet its day to day running costs of around £2,000 a week. Without doubt it's a great deal to have to raise from a small rural parish. Similarly, despite the support it receives from its status as a Church of England aided school and its 'Good' OFSTED and 'Outstanding' SIAMS reports, like many rural schools, Bishop Wilson School in Burton finds that its budgets are under pressure. The excellent facilities provided to the villages of Burton and Puddington by Gladstone Village Hall and the Sports and Social Club have to be paid for and the committees work hard to generate income.

If a relatively affluent area such as this part of Wirral and Cheshire finds it difficult to manage, how much more of a strain must it be for people living in areas with far greater social and financial deprivation, where day to day reliance on having to manage several jobs at once is the norm and where foodbanks and income support are essential and the only way that families can make ends meet. Food for thought.

I came across a wonderful book a few weeks ago; at first I thought it was a children's book. It's called 'The Book of

Mistakes' by Corinna Luyken and it takes small mistakes in pictures like accidental ink splodges and makes them into leaves floating across the page. Misshapen spots and mistakes are incorporated into her artwork in unexpected ways and it shows that even big mistakes can be the source of the brightest ideas.

The film actress Sophia Loren observed that 'mistakes are part of the dues one pays for a full life.' None of us are exempt from making mistakes. A Chinese proverb takes it further by saying:

## **even** The glory is not in never falling, but in rising every time you fall.

G K Chesterton who wrote the Father Brown detective stories couldn't read until he was 8 and one of his teachers told him ' If we could open up your head we should not find any brain but only a lump of white fat.'! He didn't give up and became a writer, poet, philosopher and art critic.



*I wonder if his old teacher ever read any of his books!* 

How does Jesus deal with failure? Peter completely failed Jesus when he denied knowing him. Yet Jesus lovingly allowed Peter the opportunity to be forgiven and restored. Peter could have just given up and left altogether, crushed by his failure as Judas was. But Peter took the offer to be restored again and learn from his mistake.

There are so many Bible characters who failed in some way. They all learnt that through their failures, God was their strength.

#### HYMN STORIES

#### 'Rock of Ages'

#### Augustus Toplady (1740-1778)

Rock of ages, cleft for me, let me hide myself in thee; let the water and the blood, from thy riven side which flowed, be of sin the double cure; cleanse me from its guilt and power..

Not the labours of my hands can fulfil thy law's demands; could my zeal no respite know, could my tears for ever flow, all for sin could not atone; thou must save, and thou alone.

Nothing in my hand I bring, simply to thy cross I cling; naked, come to thee for dress; helpless, look to thee for grace; foul, I to the fountain fly; wash me, Saviour, or I die.

While I draw this fleeting breath, when my eyelids close in death, when I soar through tracts unknown, see thee on thy judgment throne; Rock of ages, cleft for me, let me hide myself in thee.

*Augustus Toplady* was born in England in 1740. His father was a Royal Marine and died during the Battle de Cartagena de Indias soon after his son's birth, leaving the boy to be raised by his mother, Catherine. Catherine and her son moved from Farnham to Westminster and he attended Westminster School from 1750 to 1755. In 1755, Catherine and Augustus moved to Ireland, and Augustus was enrolled in Trinity College, Dublin.



Shortly thereafter, the 15-year-old Augustus attended a sermon preached by James Morris, a follower of John Wesley and he became determined to go into ministry. Augustus initially aimed to become a Methodist minister. This changed, however, when he began to consider the distinctions between Arminianism and Calvinism. The Methodist movement was decidedly Arminian, and after he studied the 39 Articles of the Church of England, he became convinced of the Calvinistic perspective and became a minister in the Church of England.

The issue of Calvinism versus Arminianism was a hot topic in the church in those days, and for the remainder of his life Augustus would write and debate on the subject, arguing at length for the doctrine of election. Unfortunately, towards the end of his short life, the debate grew increasingly ugly, resulting in a major and public rift between him and John Wesley.

Folklore has it that the hymn was inspired by a rock cleft in which Augustus once took refuge in Burrington Combe Gorge in Somerset. However, the story is probably apocryphal and was probably inspired by the preface of John and Charles Wesley's *Hymns on the Lord's Supper* (1745) which contains a prayer voicing many similarities.

#### BURTON MERE WETLANDS EXPLODES INTO LIFE

Despite the unsettled weather at the start of spring, the reserve is now a hive of activity, exploding with colour and life. Summer is in full swing, and a scorching 31 degrees outside in July. This warmer weather brought a spectacular show of insects, especially butterflies, moths, dragonflies and damselflies. With wall brown butterfly, six and narrow-bordered five spot burnet moths, brown hawker dragonfly and red-eyed damselfly, all particularly prominent.

There's been heaps of warbler activity, with successful breeding of both lesser whitethroat and willow warbler at the Burton Point railway bridge. And at least 8 pairs of Cetti's warbler on the reserve, as well as our highest numbers yet of breeding reed warbler. It's been a good year for grasshopper warbler too. In early April a wood warbler, with its distinctive 'spinning coin' song, took up residence in Gorse Covert Wood for four days, and was enjoyed by many visiting bird watchers and bluebell admirers alike. Other scarce migrants that have dropped in over the spring, were a white stork, ringed-necked duck (all the way from America), and a gull-billed tern.

It's been an exceptional year for breeding waders, with productivity exceeding all previous years. Over 100 pairs of Lapwing have so far fledged just over 100 young. 70 pairs of Avocet have fledged over 80 young (with some still sitting), and over 35 pairs of Redshank have fledged over 40 young. This gives us a rough figure of over 1 fledged young for each pair of waders, which is excellent when compared to the 0.7 figure that the RSPB uses as the target figure as a marker of success. The Golden Welly - an internal RSPB prize for the most breeding waders - rightfully deserves to continue to sit on the Burton Mere Wetlands office mantelpiece.

We have yet another addition to the orchids with only the third record of a pyramidal orchid, and the broad-leaved hellebore back again this year, which makes five orchids onsite now. The event involved wild camping overnight in the newly opened garden area, with exclusive guided walks exploring the reserve under the cover of darkness. It included exciting evening activities such as moth trapping, bat watching, and we were hoping to see the badgers too!

Gwen and Alice our residential volunteers have settled in to life on the reserve amazingly well, getting stuck into an array of different tasks and jobs, from sheep roundups on the marsh to pre-dawn avocet counts. You may even spot them in reception talking to visitors about all the brilliant wildlife there is to see at Burton Mere Wetlands.

Alice was particularly pleased to show people their very first lapwing, saying:

'It was so lovely to see the lapwing, and we were then able to show visitors walking past and share our special moment with them which they appreciated.'

They have also been so important in helping us to keep the Badger Hide Hire going after hours, and have been able to get some great views themselves, with Gwen proclaiming it was one of her best ever wildlife watching experiences.

Sea of pink, asters, stocks, nicotiana and pansies were planted in containers and pots and are a blaze of colour.

The geraniums are in full bloom but not all survived the winter. The dahlias are growing on well. Three new dahlias were purchased and all but two survived having been left in the ground over winter.

Sweet peas are blooming after a slow start. The roses have been wonderful, especially 'Buff Beauty' (apricot) and 'Rosa Mundi' (pink flush). The small shrubbery needed drastic attention with many bushes and shrubs requiring hard pruning.

The common jasmine (white/pinkish flowers) has a wonderful perfume and has been in full bloom. The purple and white hebes have been lovely and a haven for bees. There are several lace caps (one lovely blue and two pink). Their florets are ideal to press as well as providing decorations for the house.

The Great Tits have now vacated their box. There have been lots of Blue Tits, Goldfinches and the odd Greenfinch as well as a Nuthatch. We are yet to see the young robins!
