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Bishop of Chester

Following the retirement of Dr Peter Forster last September the Church of England has been undertaking a period of consultation regarding the appointment of the next Bishop of Chester by seeking the views of a wide cross-section of individuals and interested parties.

Establishing the needs of the diocese has been the first stage of the process and has involved holding discussions within the diocese to agree what the challenges and priorities are for the ministry of the next diocesan bishop and, in the light of these, the skills and gifts that he or she is likely to need.

Because of the variety of roles which diocesan bishops have, not only within the Church of England but also in the local community and the nation at large, the choice of the next Bishop of Chester is not made by representatives of the diocese alone.

Six diocesan representatives have been elected to work with representatives of the Church of England as a whole, under the presidency of the Archbishops. They form the Crown Nominations Commission, the body that will ultimately decide who will be the next Bishop of Chester.

The Vicar Writes . . .

As we have begun a new decade already so much has happened that has been unexpected. If we have learned anything from the last decade surely one of the lessons is ... expect the unexpected!

With such rapid changes it can be hard to place hope in the future let alone guess what that future may look or feel like.

I quite enjoy watching programmes which try to predict what will be the gadgets or trends of the future.

Tomorrow's World was compulsory viewing in our house as I grew up and some of the predictions made in a 1989 programme about 2020 have actually become true such as being able to ask your music to play without touching a button, just like Alexa or other similar brands!



However, windows that become TV screens haven't quite made it! As any gardener will tell us, what we reap in the future will be largely determined by what we sow in the present. Can we expect to reap kindness, respect or generosity if we've not taken the trouble to sow those seeds broad and wide?

There's a story of an elderly carpenter who was ready to retire. He told his employer that he was planning to leave the house building business and live more leisurely with his wife. The contractor was sorry to see his good worker go and asked him if he would build one more house as a personal favour. The carpenter agreed, but in time it was obvious his heart wasn't in his work. He resorted to shoddy workmanship and cheap materials. It was an unfortunate way to end his career.

When the house was finished his employer came to inspect the house and he handed the carpenter the key, 'This is your house' he said, 'my retirement gift to you'. If only he had known!

Our lives in the future will be affected by our choices, our decisions, our behaviour today and is that something which gives us hope or concern? Yes, there will always be the unexpected, the curve ball that no one anticipates but I have found as Corrie ten Boon wrote:



*Never be afraid to trust
an unknown future to a
known God.'*

If we put our trust in God, whatever the future holds, we will not be alone. Psalm 27 is a wonderful psalm of hope which ends with the words:

Trust in the Lord, be strong, do not despair and trust the Lord.

The writer Sarah Ban Breathnach expresses this hope another way:



Expect to have hope rekindled.

Expect your prayers to be answered in wondrous ways.

The dry seasons in life do not last.

The spring rains will come again.



Whatever we're hoping for in the year ahead, we need to ensure we've planted well.

Lent 2020

Lent is the six week period leading up to Easter. It's one of the most important times of year for Christians around the world. From its start on Ash Wednesday, the day following Shrove Tuesday (pancake day) until its conclusion on Easter Sunday, Lent has been a traditional time for fasting or giving up something or abstinence. As part of Lent, St Nicholas' Church will be running a Lent Course - a time of reflection and learning.

Lent Course 2020

This year we will once again be joining with other churches from Neston District Churches Together [NDCT] to host an ecumenical Lent group. We will be using the York Course called 'Superstar'.

The course booklet is written by David Wilbourne who studied Natural Sciences and Theology at Cambridge.

David writes; *It's 1970 – Edward Heath becomes PM, Apollo 13 limps back to earth, and Jesus Christ Superstar takes the West End by storm, asking daring questions that gave colour to my former monochrome faith and fired my vocation. Half a century on, its message remains just as relevant and we explore themes from its iconic lyrics in the 5 sessions of this course.*

The sessions will be held at The Vicarage on Tuesday evenings at 8pm starting on Tuesday 3 March.

- Session 1. Who is Jesus?
- Session 2. Miracles
- Session 3. The Psalms
- Session 4. The Church
- Session 5. Cross Purposes



Everyone is welcome to join us for all or just one of the group sessions.

St Nicholas' Church Bells

The bells ring out for weddings, great national occasions, and of course every week. They also console us with poignant half-muffled ringing on contemplative occasions. Change-ringing is an almost uniquely English tradition, going back many centuries, and it involves considerable and satisfying skill.

The bells were cast in 1724, and they needed no major overhaul until 1896. There has been no further work done since then. The good news is that the bells themselves are still in decent order after centuries of use, but all the




working parts that enable change-ringing to be done (the big timber rope wheels, bearings, clappers, rope guides, etc.) now need replacing or refurbishing.

When starting the appeal for the refurbishment of our six change-ringing bells, it was hoped that at least £3,300 could be raised. That was the absolute minimum needed and would have relied on using all the funds, previously donated by the Friends of St Nicholas, that are intended for the ongoing routine repairs and maintenance of the church and the churchyard.

As well as an opportunity for people to sponsor an individual refurbished or replaced item, in late November, Nigel Griffiths made a sponsored pilgrimage walk from Lichfield, which was once our cathedral, to Burton. a journey of 80 miles over 5 days.

£3,300 seemed a challenging target, but the generosity of so many people, both those in the parish and many outside, have achieved roughly triple that minimum. This means that we don't now have to call on the funds of the *Friends of St Nicholas' Church*. This is of particular comfort, as the general church fabric has to be inspected in detail every five years, and the next inspection is coming up this year. These inspections always produce a list of works that need to be done, often with a significant price tag attached, so it is good to be leaving intact the money donated by the Friends for such maintenance.



In addition to donations from over a hundred individuals and families, we owe a great debt of gratitude to the Mill Wood Trust, the Bellringers of Cheshire and Wirral, the Rushworth Charitable Trust, and the Chrimes Family Trust, all of which have given most generous grants towards the cost of the works.

So, thank you to everyone who supported the appeal by sponsoring either individual components of the bells or the pilgrimage walk, and by your warm encouragement. The bells will be decommissioned at the end of January, with their working parts going to Taylors of Loughborough for repair and refurbishment. They will be back in full working order before Easter. They will then be ready to ring again for the benefit and enjoyment of future generations over the next hundred years or more, thanks to your magnificently generous support.

Nigel's own thoughts on the pilgrimage walk:

'For me, the 80-mile pilgrimage walk from Lichfield, which started as a simple fundraising project, became much more than that, not to mention one or two hazards along the way!



The kindness I received from people whom I had never previously met, and from friends, coupled with having plenty of time alone for contemplative thoughts for the initial three of the five days, made it a valuable and enriching time for me.

It was also a delight to have an increasing number of people joining in for the last two days of the walk to Burton, and to be met by Cathy and others for a short prayer of thanksgiving when we finally arrived in our own churchyard.'



As rare species return to our reed beds and marshes, we can be proud of the difference protecting this land continues to make to recovering wildlife. We were excited in 2019 also to watch the valiant nesting attempts of a pair of exotic spoonbills and look forward to this year's breeding season with hope that they, too, will be successful.

2020 will bring further changes to the reserve. As some of you may know, we said a fond goodbye to our warden, Al Grubb, in October and we hope you will join us in welcoming Becky Longden, as she stepped into the role of warden this January.

This coming year will also herald the replacement of the Inner Marsh Farm hide, as we complete a project to improve the accessibility of the older part of Burton Mere Wetlands with further boardwalks and ramped access. Dating back to 1992, it's about time for an upgrade! We'll be excited to open the new structure and fully accessible path later this year.

Talking of accessibility, did you know that it's never been easier to help your little ones learn about the natural world with us? Our 'Little Explorer' events trialed last autumn have been of growing popularity, and it's been wonderful to see preschoolers starting their journey with wildlife at our family-friendly sessions on Monday mornings. These are set to continue on the second and fourth Monday of each month.

*Find Out What's Been Happening
Down the Garden Path ...*

A lovely time of year ...

This is a lovely time of year with new growth everywhere and, of course, beautiful spring flowering bulbs. What a delight, at the time of writing (January) to find spears of green with white tips – Galanthus Nivalis. Eranthis Hyemalis (winter aconites) are yet to appear.



This is a busy season. The buddleia will be pruned back hard in February and later roses will be pruned. The camellias have masses of buds and their lovely blooms eagerly awaited (pale pink, white, red and crimson).

The hydrangeas will be dead headed when the danger of frost has passed.



The old flower heads of the hydrangea protect the new buds underneath.

Hellebores are also yet to bloom, but any large leaves will be trimmed when buds appear.

A lovely patio rose will have to be re-potted as its current home is badly damaged. This should have been covered in the frost! The geraniums which are housed indoors seem to have survived the winter. The new rhododendron (a supermarket purchase) is planted in a large pot and has wintered well and growing on strongly. Some very wet fallen leaves remained in the rear garden and had to be gently raked off to allow the many bulbs to grow on.

The seed trays in the greenhouse had a further wash and need filling with compost ready for seeds to be sown.

Our feathered friends kindly left some berries on the holly for Christmas decorations.

Green/gold finches, nuthatch, blackbirds, blue/great and long-tailed tits are frequent visitors, a pair of robins continue to chase sparrows and Jenny Wren prefers the front garden.

Community Support Officer (PCSO)

Police have been made aware that a number of residents have been targeted by fraudsters online.

Emails are sent from individuals, claiming to be members of the clergy, asking parishioners to purchase gift vouchers from local supermarkets on their behalf.

The emails may appear legitimate at first glance, but you may notice a slightly different email address or spelling errors.

Once the gift vouchers have been purchased, the fraudsters then ask you for the serial numbers on the back of the voucher/card. This enables them to access the monetary value and you will be left out of pocket.

- If you receive a similar email, text or phone call do not respond to it
- Never divulge your bank details or personal information
