




LOOKING FORWARD TO CHRISTMAS

On 11 October I was licensed as a Lay Reader for the parishes of Burton & Shotwick at Chester Cathedral by Bishop Mark. This followed two years of part-time study at Emmanuel Theological College and a year of 'foundations' training with Chester Diocese.





I was impressed how both churches pulled together during the vacancy after our previous vicar, Cathy Helm, left and I am confident that we will all take the opportunity to participate in whatever way we feel able. At this time of change we will also be supported by the generous help of several visiting clergy.

I've lived in Burton for over seven years now. I was born in Heswall and grew up there and in Caldy. In fact in my teens I often used to cycle over from Caldy to visit my friend Christopher Gayford, who lived at Puddington Old Hall. It has been wonderful coming back to my old stomping ground!



As we head towards the Christmas period, I will be looking forward to helping with the Messy Church team and taking part in other services as we look to celebrate Christmas with the younger children and their parents who attend these Christmas events.

It's also a privilege to have the chance to visit Bishop Wilson School as well as

St Winefride's Primary School where a group of us from the church act out Bible stories (part of a national scheme called 'Open the Book') in their assemblies once a month. These are great fun – occasionally more panto than formal theatre – we all enjoy performing the stories and the children seem to look forward to it.



I'm really pleased that the new Burton & Puddington Events group (under the auspices of Gladstone Village Hall) has had the chance to help organise a few events since we formed earlier this year – notably the VE day celebrations and the recent burial of the time capsule. We hope to encourage and facilitate more community events which I think are so important now many of us spend so much time online rather than meeting face to face.

I have also been welcomed by the congregation in Shotwick and always appreciate my time there. St Michael's is a very special church, with a wonderful history of continued worship of God. Like St Nicholas', it also has strong connections with those who sailed the then navigable Dee Estuary.




St Nicholas' Church and St Michael's Church will each be holding an annual 'Time to Remember' service on Sunday 2 November.



New Lay Reader for Burton & Shotwick

On Saturday 11 October Philip Hillman, who is a resident of Burton Village, was licensed as a Lay Reader for our two parish churches. The special service for new lay readers and pastoral workers was led by Mark Tanner, the Rt Rev the Lord Bishop of Chester



Philip was supported on the day by many members of St Nicholas' Church and of St Michael's Church congregations as well as by friends, members of his family and by those who have been involved in his training.

At the Cathedral's licensing service Philip was invited to read one of the lessons.

As the parishes currently await the appointment of a new vicar, Philip has agreed to take a number of services each month, not all services. He will not seek to operate as quasi vicar, rather as a licensed minister supporting our two churches alongside visiting clergy who will also be taking some of our services.

The congregations of both churches welcome the opportunity to have Philip lead their services and are grateful to him for his commitment and his ministry amongst our local communities.



Pastoral Care Visiting & Holy Communion at Home

Life events such as baptisms, marriages and funerals will continue to be managed through the church's normal channels by our parish administrator and Churchwardens.

Visiting people throughout the parish who live alone or are housebound, in care or in hospital has always been a mainstay of ministry at St Nicholas' Church. The PCC have made arrangements to ensure that people's pastoral care visits and Holy Communion at home needs are managed properly and sensitively.

Pastoral Care and Holy Communion at home will both be coordinated by John Church and his contact details are: 0151 336 2228 or 07703199132 or via email at john_sue44@hotmail.co.uk.

Please don't assume that someone else has alerted John about someone who needs to be visited as it is important to respond to any requests on a timely basis.



And, if you visit someone as a friend and wish to have these visits coordinated, please contact John.

Holy Communion at Home

In preparation for the vacancy three Eucharistic ministers were approved by John Coyne and endorsed by the Bishop of Birkenhead, Julie Conalty. They are: Anne Parsons, Tony Carter and John Church and they will be supported by Lay Readers John Morris-Best and Philip Hillman. Collectively they will deliver Holy Communion at home using bread and wine that will have been consecrated by an ordained minister at a Holy Communion Service following the appropriate liturgy.

Bereavement & End of Life Visiting

Local ordained clergy will normally be asked to assist under these circumstances and, if necessary, further assistance will be sought from the Rural Dean.

Rhos Male Voice Choir Charity Concert

The charity concert on 11 October sold 119 tickets with income of £2,380. Everybody, including the organisers and helpers, paid for their tickets.

The male voice choir, who incur significant overheads in performing these concerts, reduced their fee



for this event to £800 and the musicians (oboe and accompanist) did not charge. The hire of additional toilets (£180) and refreshments (£234) brought the total cost of staging the event to £1,214 resulting in a profit on the night of £1,166 which will be shared equally between St Nicholas' Church and Wirral Foodbank - £583 each.

The event was very much enjoyed by all and only made possible by the group of organisers and helpers who all played a part in ensuring that the evening was successful.

The event was sold out and many people commented on the fact that is was so nice to see the church full of people for what was truly a community event. Many thanks to all those who supported the charity evening.



Nigel Griffiths' Charity Walk



On 3 October, Nigel reached Inverness on the last leg of his 900 mile walk this year.

Nigel's charity walk is a venture to raise much needed funds for those who, through, no fault of

their own, are forced to rely on foodbanks.

This leg took Nigel through miles of Culloden Forest: "a huge and very well managed woodland, which made for pleasurable walking. The Battle of Culloden was a bloodbath end to the 1745 Jacobite Rebellion, but no evidence of that horror was present in today's calm woodland, I am glad to say."

"I re-start northwards from Inverness next April. Have a good Winter. Thank you all for your much-appreciated huge upport and interest in this challenging fund-raising venture"

A Nip In The Air

The Buddleia Davidii (white) have been pruned by one-third, the remainder to have a thorough prune in late February.

Alec's Red has just ceased flowering as has Mrs Tottering-by-Gently.

Sweet pea seeds, Nimbus, Robert Uvedale and Swan Lake were purchased. Seeds from Misty Mountain were harvested. Some seeds from the agapanthus have been collected

There are some berries on the holly so, hopefully, the birds will spare a few for my Christmas decorations.

The dahlias in the large pot will be cut back and the tubers left in situ. The pot will then be covered with fleece and, hopefully, will survive the winter.

Mini iris, tulips and daffodils have been planted in various tubs and pots.

The lovely rose, Cardinal Richelieu was growing into Harry Lauder (twisted hazel) so both have been cut back into their own space.

Buds are already forming on the camellias and they are watered with cold tea left over from the teapot.

The hydrangeas are donning their winter hues; the lacecaps are still showing their pale colours.

The feathered friends are again regular visitors, namely nuthatch, blue/great tits, greater spotted woodpecker, blackbirds and Robbie Robin. An unwelcome visitor was a sparrowhawk perched on the edge of the roof! A wonderful sound at this time of year comes from the large numbers of geese flying overhead

It's October at the Foodbank. St Nicholas' Church has just hosted a charity concert by the Rhos Male Voice Choir. The Foodbank's general manager (a Welshman) came along and loved the singing. Thank you for benefitting the Foodbank as well as the Church with this event. It's much appreciated.

Thanks to the generosity of people like you, the Foodbank has been able to provide emergency food and support to thousands of local individuals and families facing crisis across Wirral. Sadly, demand continues, with people walking through our doors in desperate need — many for the very first time. In the last twelve months the Foodbank has provided emergency food parcels for 14,185 people. Nearly 40% of all parcels are for families. There is some encouragement that this figure is slightly down on last year, although demand continues to be high.

Rising living costs, unstable incomes, and unexpected emergencies have left many people with nowhere else to turn. We continue to need your help to ensure no one in our community goes hungry. With your support, we can continue to provide:

Emergency food parcels – meeting the immediate needs of individuals and families. Unfortunately, demand exceeds food donations, consequently, we are having to buy more food. Last year we spent just over £60,000 on buying food items.

Support through Foodbank Plus (delivered on our behalf by Citizens Advice Wirral) addressing the root cause of food insecurity. In the last twelve months Foodbank Plus has supported 2,628 people, who were helped with 4,528 issues. It delivered more than £1,000,000 of financial gains to these people, including debt write off, benefit entitlements and other support.

Burton Mere Wetlands

Past highlights

Apart from all our regular waders, ducks, geese and egrets, throughout the past summer there have been some spectacular highlights. Hobby has been seen frequently hunting dragonflies. The Bittern has frequently provided good sightings from the visitor centre. A Glossy Ibis visited the reserve on two occasions during September and four were photographed at Parkgate early October.

Other notable sightings have been Willow Tit, first seen in August. The timid bird likes damp, young and regenerating woodland. Its recent decline makes it a Red List species and one we are most pleased to have sighted.

Another exciting discovery was of a Willow Emerald Damselfly which was seen frequently near the wildlife garden pond throughout late summer. This is a new species for the reserve and the first recorded in the area.

What to expect this autumn and winter

Autumn brings a host of winter migrant waders to the scrapes of RSPB Burton Mere Wetlands and the Dee Estuary. Pink-footed Geese have already arrived

in large numbers and will be seen flying over the estuary in their famous V formations as they return to the saltmarsh to roost.

We have seen the first Hen Harriers of the season from Burton Point over the saltmarsh, and we await the return of Short-eared Owls. Our wintering duck species, particularly Wigeon, Pintail and Teal are now coming in large numbers, and the eagle-eyed birdwatcher will be looking for a Green-winged Teal amongst the flock.

We have also had the first sighting of a Whooper Swan and hope to see Bewick Swans soon. November is also the month when many Starlings gather and fly to roost in the reedbed, often harassed by our resident Marsh Harriers.
