




Celebrating the Harvest each year is both modern and ancient. The traditional British Harvest Festival emerged in Victorian times in Cornwall but in fact it has

been variously marked for millennia going back to pre-Christian times. Christians have a profound sense of God the Creator engaging with his creatures and Creation in daily life and work. Our Harvest hymns capture this well and additionally remind us that our own lives are meant to become a harvest of growing faith and kindness to all.



Harvest has a universal appeal and it is also marked in many different cultures.

#### AT VENDIMIA, MENDOZA, ARGENTINA

On the final Sunday of February, the Archbishop of Mendoza sprinkles the season's first grapes with holy water and offers the new vintage to God, setting off a month of celebrations.

Crowds line the streets to watch a parade of competing beauty queens atop their regional floats, and the festival culminates with a spectacular show at the amphitheatre; musicians, entertainers, and dancers take to the stage before a Harvest Queen is chosen

against a backdrop of spectacular fireworks.

#### SUKKOT, JERUSALEM, ISRAEL

Sukkot celebrates Israel's bountiful harvests and recalls the time when the Israelites wandered the desert living in temporary shelters. Families build makeshift huts, or sukkah, with roofs open to the sky. Here they eat, and sometimes sleep, for the next seven days. Wands of willow, myrtle, and palm, together with a citron (a kind of



lemon), are shaken every day in all directions to honour the gifts from the land.

Celebrating Harvest is somehow deeply embedded in human lives and although few of us are directly involved in agriculture in modern Britain, Harvest has an abiding importance. We remain conscious of the impact of the environment on harvesting food, not only changing farming practices but influencing what we now sow as crops because of climate change. Food miles make us aware of the need to procure foods without harming the world's environment.

The joyful delights of harvest celebrations are coupled with a growing awareness of those who experience food poverty, drought and famine which have been present across the world ever since agriculture developed. Thanksgiving for what we have and generosity to those who lack life's basics is as vital today as ever it was.



Our parishes will mark the harvest Festival at Burton on 6 October and at Shotwick the following Sunday, 13 October, and everyone is welcome to join us. Whether you choose to come to a service in church, through local schools or at village events, it's clear that Harvest is a time for everyone to mark with reflection, thanksgiving and generosity, exercised with imagination and knowledge of what it means in the 21st Century.

Come you thankful people, come, raise the song of harvest home.

We are aware that a number of people already make regular visits to people whom they know, to both church members and non-church members. This is to be encouraged, particularly amongst people who live alone or are house-bound. If you become aware of someone that you feel would benefit from a visit from one of our lay readers, please advise me and I will make suitable arrangements and coordinate activity with the vicar and others."




Celebrating 300 Years of a Fantastic Village School...






## Come Along to One of Our Meetings



# St Michael's Church Stained Glass Window by Trena Mary Cox (1895-1980)



St Michael's Church is fortunate to

have a window designed and made by Trena Cox, a gifted stained glass artist who worked in Chester for nearly 50 years. The altar window in

Shotwick Church depicts the Archangel Michael vanquishing Satan in the form of a dragon.

Born and brought up on the Wirral, Emma Trina Cox changed her name to Trena Mary Cox when she registered at the Laird School of Art in Birkenhead in 1917 where she studied painting, drawing and design. By 1923 she had started to exhibit designs for stained glass and the following year she moved to Chester.



Through the 1930s and 1940s Trena Cox produced a number of exquisite windows, generally of saints dressed in richly coloured garments, their delicately painted faces framed with magnificent halos. Flowers, butterflies, birds and fish often featured in these windows and the background quarries (individual panes of glass) were covered with symbols and patterns.

There is an exhibition at Chester Cathedral from 7 October to 8 November 'Trena Cox: Reflections 100' - an exploration through exhibition and art of the legacy of one of Chester's unsung heroines.

### Burton Mere Wetlands

Summer Arrives At Last!

As we are all aware the weather this summer has not been the best! The prolonged wet spells were not to the liking of our visitors, particularly those looking for dragonflies and butterflies, but it has meant a good season for plant growth. A walk down the path in many places is accompanied by reeds that tower 2-3 feet over our heads.

The breeding season has been very mixed with the results from the main scrape affected by the visit of a rogue badger who sadly managed to take out most of the breeding birds in this area. The ducks and other wildfowl, including Lapwing and Redshank who breed out on the wet grassland area, have been more successful.

There has been an average to good success rate this year, including 20 pairs of Avocets moving to the Saltmarsh and fledging several chicks.

The path in the garden was closed until recently due to the poor weather and muddy conditions, but we have now laid a new hard path and a great new viewing area by the pond. Here we are seeing lots of dragonfly and damselfly activity, including a new species for the reserve, a small Red-Eyed Damselfly.

The most recent excitement was the visit of a very rare bird, a Hudsonian Godwit. It is an American bird, and it was only the tenth sighting reported in the UK. It stayed for nearly 24 hours, so over 300 happy visitors were able to add the bird to their life lists.

## Tales From foodbank



Things are normal at the Foodbank. We're seeing about as many clients per week as we were last year, so the good news is that the number's no longer increasing. Food price inflation is also quite low – recent headlines suggested that overall inflation has picked up, but that's been driven mostly by things like air travel, hotels and package holidays, while food inflation is lower than the overall number. As you know, energy prices have fallen but will rise again in the colder months putting pressure back on household budgets.

The Wirral Foodbank is taking part in Trussell Trust's 'Lay it All Out' project where we're asking foodbank clients to share why it is that they needed to visit a foodbank. They're writing a brief summary of their experience onto tablecloths, which will all make their way from around the country to Westminster later this year to be shared with MPs as part of Trussell's campaign to end hunger.

Food donations are still sorely needed and can be made at many supermarkets. In particular the local Foodbanks are looking for donations of:

## A Season of Wonderful Colour!

The leaves are already starting to turn and the berries are on the rowan saplings.

It has been a very unusual summer. The sweet peas were slow to

flower but then produced the best blooms ever.

#### The Gladstone Village Hall Solar Project Sunny Side Up!



As reported in the last edition of the Parish Magazine, Gladstone Village Hall has installed a solar energy system. Funded in part by the FCC Communities Foundation, installation began in June and was completed in July.

The panels are certainly visible (though only from the SSW in truth), but they are an important and visual reminder of our commitment to reducing our carbon footprint.

#### How is the system performing?

"It is a truth, universally acknowledged, that a hall with a solar panel system must be in want of the sun" (apologies to Jane Austen)

It has to be said that this poor summer has been unkind, to gardens and to solar power enthusiasts! However, by the end of June, the weather was becoming more typical, and there were extended periods of sunshine.

We now have a complete month on which to look back (July). The two systems (Pavilion and Hall) are essentially independent, but very similar in specification. For example, in the Pavilion, over the month of July, we used 880 kiloWatt hours. The key statistic from the report is that during this time, we only drew 170 kiloWatt hours from the grid, the remainder coming from our own systems. This means that we were 80% self-sufficient in our electricity needs. Admittedly, these reflect the good summer months, and it will be less dramatic in the winter.

The system is working well and we're making a significant reduction in our carbon footprint – we saved the emission of about 600 kg of carbon dioxide being released to the atmosphere. An important step in improving our green credentials!
